

ST. FRANCIS: You'd better sit down, Lord. As soon as the leaves fall, the Seniors rake them into great piles and pay to have them hauled away!

GOD: You must be joking!! What do they do to protect the shrubs and tree roots in the winter to keep the soil moist and loose?

ST. FRANCIS: After throwing the leaves away, they go out and buy something called mulch. They haul it home and spread it around in place of the leaves.

GOD: And where do they get this mulch?

ST. FRANCIS: They cut down the trees and grind them up to make mulch!

So now you know, our overgrown, weedy yards are just the way they were meant to be. I can hear the birds singing and the bees humming now. Just sayin'

NOTES FROM THE BAY RANCH OFFICE

ou must register at the office if you have something parked in the field north of the clubnouse, or see Brent (maintenance).

The office has canceled its Facebook page, "From the Office of Bay Ranch." While garbage remains a troublesome topic in our park, we have another disposal problem: sewage. A number of tenants have had problems with drains and toilets backing up. Frank's plumbing has said these back-ups are caused by putting grease, paper towels, and cloth-like materials down the drains. Bay Ranch will not pay to unclog sewers when the clog is caused by inappropriate items put down the sewer. The tenant will have to pay for this problem.

Eds. Note: those so-called flushable personal cleansing cloths are really NOT FLUSHABLE. They do not disintegrate in the sewer system, and they WILL clog the sewer someplace in the system. Lots of people like to use these cloths in the bathroom, but PLEASE do not put them in the toilet. Limit what goes into the toilet to toilet paper and tampons (is this an allowable word in a community of seniors?).

Eds. Note: My housemates and I had to hire a plumber when our own drain system clogged due to dishwasher detergent that was not well dissolved. We had virtual rocks of detergent blocking the drain. Our solution (after paying the plumber): liquid detergent.

The new management is serious about maintaining a clean and neat park. Managing garbage is a big part of this.

- Please, put ALL garbage in the dumpsters, even big and heavy items like furniture.
- DO NOT dump behind, beside or anywhere near the trash bins. Put the garbage in the bins.
- Put household trash in the smaller trash bins.
- Do not bring garbage to the bins on Monday morning. By that time, the bins are overflowing. Wait until Monday afternoon or later, when the bins are empty.
- Pick up for furniture, tree brush/limbs and other debris will be on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday only. Put out trash after 5:00 p.m, the day before.



- DO NOT DISPOSE OF TVS OR ELECTRONICS IN THE PARK. DO NOT PUT THEM IN OR BESIDE THE DUMPSTER. We get fined. Call pinellascounty.org/recycle to dispose of them.
- If you need help disposing of something, someone in the park may help you for a fee Rent Increase: Most residents already know that \$15 rent increase will go into effect starting January 1, 2019. Those in the non pet section paying \$557 will be paying \$572 starting January 1, 2019. Those on a corner lot or in the pet will be paying \$580. The increase for everyone is \$15.

The following information remains in force:

Rules: The Park has rules that everyone received and reviewed when they bought or rented their coach. <u>Please read and follow them.</u> Failure to follow rules is grounds for eviction, and management has shown that it is willing to evict.

No cars may be parked on the street at night. Failure to follow this rule may lead to the offending car being towed, resulting in fines. [Ed. Note: I can verify this. EVEN IF you run out to the street before they hook up your car to tow, you will get the fine.]

Cars parked on the street during the day should be staggered so emergency vehicles can pass by. Do not park on the grass or sidewalk.

Fires: Test your smoke detectors to make sure they work. Recommended action: purchase a fire extinguisher if you don't have one and know how to work it. If a fire starts, spray it with the fire extinguisher immediately and GET OUT OF THE HOUSE. Fire destroys mobile homes very quickly.

Visitors: Reminder:that rent is based on one or two per household. Each person above the two must pay an additional \$30 a month, including visitors who stay over 30 days. Please be proactive about this and pay the money without first being reminded.

Other announcements:

The purified water dispenser at the clubhouse operates on its own schedule. After someone has filled containers, it may take the dispenser some time to regenerate enough water for more containers. There is a light on the dispenser that tells whether it is ready.

Some have questioned why the application fee is "so high." One reason is to help cover garbage fees, since new owners usually throw away most of the furniture and electronics.

Mr. Larson (the owner) calls the lawn service for lawn care on an as-needed basis. The park pays for lawn mowing, etc., once a month but the need sometimes goes unnoticed. If you notice the lawn needs trimming, please let the office know so they can call Mr. Larson.

Sometimes an automobile will leak oil onto our new, nice looking pavement, creating an eyesore. If you notice a leak by your house, call the office to have it cleaned up. Let's keep these streets looking nice!

Lost and Found Dog/Cat: If you have found a dog or cat, you can post on a site called <u>pawboost.com</u> or call Animal Service on Walsingham. If you call, Animal Services will come out, free of charge, to pick up an animal.


BAY RANCH PROFILE: Jerry Olson

It's been 66 years since Jerry Olson was in the trenches on the front lines of the Korean War, but the nightmares he encountered from that ordeal still linger on today. They always will.

The sound of thunder, a car or a motorcycle backfiring on a nearby street or the rippling sound of a power saw usually result in Jerry ducking. Actually, he ducks at the sound of any noise. He also experiences nightmares, seeing his fellow buddies in Korea lying dead beside him in the trenches and flashes across the sky with bombs exploding.

Until 13 and a half years ago, when Jerry went to bed every night he always had a rifle within his reach beside the bed. That's how bad the Korean War affected him.

He was drafted October 1st, 1952 into the U.S. Army and was sent to Arkansas for basic training. It was supposed to be a nine month course overall but it wasn't. Within seven weeks, Jerry along with his regiment was shipped out to Korea and almost immediately he saw action. "I saw enough action in three weeks to do me a lifetime," said Jerry, who like many of us is a snowbird in the winter months at Bay Ranch.

Within three weeks of stepping foot on foreign soil he was at Pork Chop Hill, a historic site of two battles during the Korean War. "I think I was there four days as I never slept any length of time. There were also times you didn't know whether it was day or night with flashes in the sky, grenades and bombs going off in the air. There were guys dead in the bunkers covered in blood and guts hanging out. I just picked up another rifle and stuck it out. There was just no continued on page 38



place to go. Unless you have experienced it firsthand, people really have no idea what we went through over there."

Jerry was on the front lines in 1953 from March to July 27. If he wasn't, he was never very far from it. To add to the woes were Korea's adverse weather conditions. The winter was cold, dropping to 35 below zero at times and in the summer a lot of rain. August was hot. It wasn't tropical but extremely hot, which meant they had to deal with a lot of bugs. "It was so cold in the winter that my feet froze," added Jerry.

Jerry was never wounded but he was hit. Fortunately, the jacket he was wearing inside his uniform protected him from the bullet. "It hit me so hard it knocked the wind out of me, but it didn't draw any blood."

He returned from Korea to the United States in May, 1954, just before Mother's Day, and attended a Memorial Service. He also got an opportunity to see his wife Nancy and for the first time, his daughter, who was born May 18, 1953 while he was overseas. However, he was still in the Army. He was sent to Missouri and joined a company all of them just waiting to be discharged. Finally the first of October Jerry returned home to join his family.

As a result of the war, Jerry suffers from PTSD (Post Traumatic Stress Disorder). Nevertheless, he wasn't diagnosed with PTSD until a few years ago. He passed on going to the VA because he felt there were other individuals who deserved it more than himself. He finally went to the VA to get checked out. A service officer from the American Legion was there and asked various questions as to why he was there. Jerry told him about his lack of hearing, frozen toes and a bummed up left knee. Then Jerry mentioned the nightmares he was experiencing. That was something totally different, and the officer suggested he see a psychologist.

"It did cost me. She asked me questions I didn't want to answer but I did. Tears came to my eyes and to hers. When she got done talking to me, she sent a letter to Veterans Affairs, and I got a copy, saying this man is unemployable. I called her and said, 'Ma'am, I've worked all my life,' but she had me see another psychologist."

From all the examinations and interviews, it was determined Jerry is

100 percent a disabled veteran meaning all medical, prescriptions and hearing aids were covered by the VA.

Jerry was awarded 10 medals and badges for his service in Korea. However, Jerry doesn't consider himself a hero. "I'm a survivor because I stayed and because I wanted to stay up front. There was also no place to go."

Jerry and Nancy raised four children --- two sons, Allan and Terry, and two daughters Nancy and Cindy. Terry served 20 years in the Coast Guard. His wife Nancy lost her battle with cancer about 15 years ago. Thirteen years ago, Jerry and Carol were married. "We got married August 13th, the day before my 73rd birthday. I didn't want her (Carol) to marry an older man," said Jerry with a smile." Carol's first husband was a veteran too and had passed away in 2000. When they are not at Bay Ranch, Jerry and Carol reside in East Jordan, Michigan.

Jerry is a life member of the American Legion, the Veteran of Foreign Wars and the 31st

Infantry Association. He also served as Chaplain for the Legion and the VFW for a number of years. He still goes to Memorial Services for veterans and participates in Memorial Day Services dating back to 1954.

On September 26, 2018, Jerry shared the distinct honor with a 100-year-old veteran to lay a wreath at Unknown Soldier Monument at Arlington Cemetery. Jerry was one of 64 veterans invited on the "Honor Flight to Washington" that day.

Jerry and Carol arrive December 1st at Bay Ranch. The reason for the December arrival is Jerry enjoys deer hunting in Michigan in November with his son Allan. They've been doing it for 58 years. However, that rifle he used to keep at bedside is not necessary anymore.

This soup is a popular menu item in some of our favorite restaurants. It's very rich, I creamy and delicious. Garnish with bacon bits."

Ingredients

- 1 tablespoon and 1-1/2 teaspoons margarine
- 3/4 cup chopped onion
- 3/4 teaspoon minced garlic
- 1-1/2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce
- 1-1/2 (12 fluid ounce) cans or bottles light beer
- 1-1/2 (14.5 ounce) cans chicken broth
- 1/4 cup and 1 teaspoon cornstarch
- 3 cups half-and-half w
- 3 cups shredded sharp Cheddar cheese (use a liter cheese if desired)

Directions

- 1. Melt the butter or margarine in a 4 1/2 quart soup pot over medium heat. Add the onion, I garlic and Worcestershire sauce and stir well. Add the beer and raise the heat to high and I boil for 3 minutes to evaporate the alcohol. Add the chicken broth and bring the soup back to a boil. Lower the heat to medium-low and simmer.
- 2. Combine the cornstarch with 3 tablespoons water and stir until smooth. Set aside.
- 3. Add the half-and-half and shredded cheese to the soup. Stir constantly until the cheese melts. Then stir in the cornstarch mixture. Stir constantly until the soup is thick, about 2 minutes. Serve garnished with bacon bits.
- 4. Use Popcorn to serve on it instead of crackers

Americans prefer to stay at home

Planning a vacation overseas this year? You're not exactly alone, but you're not in the majority. As reported on the NerdWallet website, a survey by Priority Pass found that only 14 percent of Americans plan to leave the United States for a vacation this year. Forty-five percent said they'd prefer to stay in the U.S.

The survey included 10,000 people in nine countries. Overall, 32 percent of respondents said they expect to go abroad for their holidays. Among other travel-related findings from the survey:

- Americans are least likely to spend a cash gift on travel. If given \$300, U.S. residents are least likely to use it to help pay for a trip. People in the United Kingdom and Mexico are most likely.
- Americans spend more on travel. Although they travel less, Americans have the highest per-person budget for overseas travel.
- Americans don't share. Finally, the survey found that Americans are least likely to share their travel memories on social media, or recommend hotels, airlines, and transportation services than residents of other countries.

We're still looking at our phones on the road

Te all know the dangers of texting while driving—or do we? A survey of drivers in Philadelphia, as reported on the Fox 8 website, found that 75 percent admit to using mobile devices behind the wheel.

They're not all kids, either. Although 91 percent of millennials reported using a smartphone or other device while driving, so did 79 percent of Gen Xers and 64 percent of Baby Boomers. What are they doing? Reading text messages or emails (48 percent), updating or checking social media (23 percent), and recording videos (18 percent). Only 9 percent of drivers in the survey said they use a "Do not disturb" app on their phones while driving.
