



The mystery of snakes' missing legs

S nakes millions of years ago had legs, but over time their legs disappeared. What happened has been a puzzle to scientists for years, but analysis of a fossil 90 million years old may suggest an explanation.

As reported on the (e)Science News website, CT scans of the ancient reptile allowed paleontologists to compare the inner ears of modern snakes to their distant ancestors. They discovered structures similar to those in creatures that burrow in the ground, but are absent in modern-day snakes. This has led them to theorize that snakes gradually lost their legs as they evolved to live and hunt in burrows. The reptile, Dinilysia patagonica, is the largest burrowing snake ever known, and its

patagonica, is the largest burrowing snake ever known, and its fossilized remains offer clues to a possible ancestor from which all modern snakes are descended.


Behind the walls of ancient tombs

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The mysteries of King Tutankhamun's tomb have yet to be fully revealed, according to Egyptologists. Egypt's minister of antiquities is seeking permission to conduct a radar inspection of the Valley of the Kings tomb in hopes of finding the remains of Queen Nefertiti, or possibly King Tut's mother Kia, buried behind the walls of the chamber.

A British scientist believes that Nefertiti lies somewhere in the tomb, although others say that Tut's mother is the more likely possibility. Either way, chances seem good that Tutankhamun's final resting place has more secrets than were previously unearthed.

In other news of ancient times, archeologists have discovered two sealed chambers and a ceremonial platform underneath the Templo Mayor, an Aztec temple in in the middle of present-day Mexico City. Explorers found a hidden tunnel in 2013, and recently uncovered a passage to what they believe is a Cuauhxicalco—a space used in rituals to burn the remains of rulers. They speculate that the sealed chambers may be the bodies of several ancient Aztec kings, possibly including the final remains of Montezuma I, who ruled the Aztecs from 1440 to 1469.



riving is embedded in our national psyche. If you feel as though you live in your car driving between home and work, consider these statistics from the AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety and the Urban Institute:

• Americans drive an average of 29.2 miles a day, for a total of 10,658 miles a year.



- Women tend to take more drives, but men spend more time on the road, driving 25 percent more miles than women.
- Drivers 30-49 years old drive an average of 13,140 miles a year. Teens and senior citizens over 65 drive less than other age groups.
- We drive more in the summer—30.6 miles a day, as opposed to the winter months, when we're on the road for just 25.7 miles daily.
- Education seems to be correlated to how much people drive: Those with no more than a high school education drive an average of 19.9 miles a day (32 minutes), while drivers with a college degree are in their cars for 37.2 miles (58 minutes).

Library use on the decline?

re libraries in danger of disappearing? A Pew Research Institute report found that most Americans strongly support their local public libraries, with 65 percent saying that the closing of a local library would have a major impact on their community. They like library services that contribute to education, along with those that help veterans, immigrants, and other special constituencies, and value access to computers and other technologies.

Still, library use appears to be trending downward: Forty-six percent of Americans age 16 and older have visited a library or bookmobile at least once during the past year, down from 53 percent in 2012. Twenty-two percent have used their library's website in the past year, down from 25 percent in 2012, and 27 percent have gone to the library to use computers and Internet resources, down again from 31 percent in 2012.

"Don't worry." His friend ordered another round. "I tied down the last page of the conductor's score, so they'll keep playing the same part over and over. No one will notice."


After a few more drinks, they staggered backstage and made their way back to their chairs as the conductor struggled to untie his music score with one hand while conducting the orchestra.

Going the store? Why leave the house?

Shopping online has exploded in recent years. One example: A survey conducted by 72 Point Inc. and commissioned by Door to Door Organics, an online organic grocer, found that shoppers increased their online grocery purchases by an average of 29 percent in the past year, and those shoppers do about 19 percent of their weekly grocery shopping via the Internet.

Extra sleep may not lead to longer life

ost of us look forward to sleeping late on the weekend. After a hard week of work, we deserve a few extra hours, right? But a study from the Journal of Clinical Endocrinology & Metabolism suggests that sleeping in may contribute to a higher risk of diabetes and heart disease.



Researchers tracked more than men and women age 30-54, using devices that recorded their movement to determine when they fell asleep and woke up for a one-week period. Close to 85 percent went to bed later and got up later on their days off from work, and those people tended to experience lower levels of HDL cholesterol (the good kind) along with higher triglycerides, greater resistance to insulin, and a higher body mass index, even after controlling for factors like physical activity, calorie consumption, and alcohol use.

The implications are clear: Maintaining a consistent sleep schedule, even on weekends, is better for everyone's long-term health.

Aspirin prevents skin cancer?

spirin is known to cure our aches and pains and improve heart health. It may also be useful in preventing certain kinds of skin cancer, according to an article on the Discover magazine website.

Non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs) like aspirin and ibuprofen are already known to help prevent cancers in the colon, lungs, prostate, and breasts. A meta-

analysis of studies, some previously unavailable to researchers, turned up evidence that non-aspirin NSAIDs can reduce the risk of developing squamous cell carcinoma by 15 percent, and that when aspirin is added to the mix, the risk drops to 18 percent. NSAIDs are known to inhibit COX-2, an enzyme produced by skin cells in response to ultraviolet light.

Talk to your dermatologist about aspirin, and otherwise limit your exposure to UV light to stay safe from skin cancer all year round.
