

Ancient human skulls hint at early European arrival

Two skulls unearthed in Greece suggest that Homo sapiens arrived in Europe from Africa much earlier than previously thought. The Sci-News website reports that the partial skulls were discovered decades ago, in 1978, but a recent re-examination allowed scientists to virtually reconstruct them.

One skull, 170,000 years old, belonged to a Neanderthal, but the other is 210,000 years old and appears to be an early modern human. This means that Homo sapiens spread out to Europe some 150,000 years earlier than believed. Scientists speculate that Neanderthals originally displaced Homo sapiens, but over time they died out as more early modern humans made their way to southern Europe.

Giant squid sighted off New Orleans coast

For the first time, a giant squid has been sighted and captured on video in U.S. waters, the *Popular Mechanics* website reports. A research vessel grabbed video of the squid, *Architeuthis dux*, 100 miles from the New Orleans coast. It's only the second footage of a giant squid in the wild; the first was captured on video in 2012 off Japan's Ogasawara archipelago.

The video was taken with a camera called Medusa, designed to resemble bioluminescent prey in the deep sea and attract predators like the giant squid to obtain a close-up look that can be recorded and studied.

Three myths about creativity

Deople have lots of misconceptions about the nature and practice of being creative. Here are some common myths to ignore (from the Livemint website):

• Creativity is serendipitous. Don't wait for the proverbial light bulb to go off inside your head. Enhance your imagination by talking to people, immersing yourself in information, and focusing on the problem you want to solve instead of hoping you'll get an idea out of the blue.

Eat blueberries to help your heart, says study

lueberries are delicious, but can they aid your heart? Maybe, according to the Medical News Today website.

A study by a team of re- searchers from the University of East Anglia in the United Kingdom and Harvard University in the United States (at least partially funded, it should be noted, by the United States Highbush Blueberry Council), found that blueberries may indeed help with high blood pressure, high blood sugar, and other metabolic conditions affecting heart health.

Specifically, the team gathered 155 participants age 70-75 who were overweight or had other metabolic symptoms and split them into three groups.

Over a six-month period, one group consumed a cup of freeze-dried powdered blueberries per day, and another group had half a cup. The third group, used as a control, consumed a powder with dextrose, maltodextrin, and fructose.

The scientists found that those eating a full cup of blueberry powder showed improvement in vascular function and arterial stiffness. They saw no improvement in those who consumed just half a cup. They credit the improvement to the presence in blueberries of anthrocyanins, which have been linked to a reduced risk of cardiovascular disease.

What's happening to the monarchs?

onarch butterflies are dying off at a potentially devastating rate, the UPI website reports, and scientists are scrambling to figure out why—and what to do.




In North America, the monarch population that migrates between the U.S. Midwest and Mexico has dropped from around 1 billion in the 1990s to 200 million in 2018, experts estimate. Another monarch population that migrates between California and the Pacific Northwest is suffering a more alarming decline—from 1.2 million in the 1990s to only 30,000 in 2018, a drop of 98%.

The cause is unknown. Some scientists speculate that climate change is disrupting migration patterns. Others theorize that urban sprawl is destroying the flowering plants that monarchs rely on. Another explanation is that the Mexican forests where the butterflies spend their winters are being overlogged.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is engaged in a study to determine whether monarchs should be covered by the Endangered Species Act. The results of the study are expected in 2020—but scientists worry that could be too late.

New material recharges devices as you walk

Soon you may be able to recharge your smartphone by taking a walk, the Science Daily website reports. Scientists at the Chinese University of Hong Kong are developing an "energy harvester" that attaches to the knee, generating 1.6 microwatts of energy when the wearer walks at a normal pace, enough to power small devices like health monitors and



GPS devices.

Scientists designed a special smart macrofiber material that generates energy from bending. The constant back-and-forth motion every time the knee flexes makes the device bend, creating electricity.

A prototype weighing just 0.68 pounds was tested on people walking at one to four miles per hour. Measurement of the wearers' breathing patterns with and without the device showed that it worked without any extra effort on the part of the walker. The device could enable users to stop worrying about the daily charge.

How do you like your pizza?

Pizza may be many people's favorite food, but it's not without controversy. Take, for example, the debate about pineapple and anchovies. The Food&Wine website reports on a survey by Slice, a pizza ordering platform, in which consumers were asked to rate different toppings.

With more than 9,000 responses to Slice's poll of customers, pineapple emerged as the least popular topping, rejected by 54% who said it shouldn't be considered a topping at all. Anchovies turned out to have some fans, though, principally in East Coast states. Delaware is where they're most popular—63% of residents there are willing to include them in their order, but only 1% of Kansans would do the same thing.

One thing many people agreed on, however, was breakfast. The survey found that 53% of respondents would prefer a slice of cold pizza for breakfast over juice and eggs.

Support for electric cars building

According to the CleanTechnica website, a survey of 1,659 Americans planning to buy a new car in the next two years have a strong interest in electric vehicles. Thirty-one percent said they'd consider an electric vehicle for their next purchase, and 27% would think about it further in the future. Five percent said they'd definitely buy or lease one for their next vehicle.

Other findings from survey participants:

- Seventy-three percent believe increased electric cars will help reduce oil use.
- Seventy-two percent said auto manufacturers should provide a wider range of electric vehicles, including SUVs, pickup trucks, and minivans.
- Seventy-two said they think increased electric car use will help reduce pollution.
- Sixty-five percent believe electric cars will help save money on fuel and maintenance.

Pet insurance on the rise

he North American Pet Health Insurance Association reports that total premiums for pet insurance have hit a new level, reaching \$1.42 billion in 2018.

In the United States, pet insurance increased 18% for 2.43 million pets. In Canada, the rate grew 10.9% for 277,000 pets. The most common coverage was for accident and illness plans. Accident and illness premiums for dogs came in at \$566 yearly in the U.S., and \$734 in Canada. For cats, the U.S. premium was \$354, and the Canadian rate was \$400.
