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

A MESSAGE FROM THE ROC BOARD OF DIRECTORS

DeeVon Schisler, ROC Secretary

Tell, it is now May and most of our snowbird residents have left for their summer homes and things are slowing down a bit. I would like to remind everyone of a few of our policies that some did not practice due diligence on, while others simply did not know. While we allow you to rent out your units at your discretion, there are some rules you need to follow. Every single renter coming in must fill out our vetting paperwork. There is no exception to this. As part of this process, we will conduct a credit check as well as a background check.

We have always required this to be done, as far as the background checks. The only addition to our policy is that since December 2018, we also require a credit check. This is done at the expense of the individuals wishing to gain admittance to our Park through our Master Occupancy Agreement. Anyone who is buying or renting must go through this process. Any foreign person/s take up to 30 days for us to get verification. This is why this all has to be done prior to admittance. The process was always to be done yearly. If that had not happened under previous management, we apologize. This policy is not new, it just has an addition. These checks that we do are good for a year, then they expire. We do all of this to keep us all safe. It gives peace of mind to know that the "people who just moved in" are safe and on the up and up. We do this yearly, as who really knows in this day and age? Anyone could come down and appear to be fine, yet may have any kind of criminal felonious activity and then come back. Would you want that type of person living next door? Or, how about the person who is renting their unit - someone rents one season, comes back and we have no idea that they are now bankrupt and have no means to pay you your rent? Well, they are here now...and you may have to spend money for legal means to get them evicted. How much will that cost you? We do all of these things to protect our residents, not to be mean or to pick on you, or your renters. Please consider this.

The second thing I am going to address is our no pet policy. We are in fact a no pet park. The animals you see are comfort animals and have rights. There are also service animals and they have even more rights than a comfort animal. We need to be mindful of this. Please know that we go through a very strict process for either of these animal types to be admitted into our Park. Our legal counsel reviews the paperwork and verifies each and every one of them. They are not pets and cannot be called pets. The ADA is very strict and very clear about this. Per capita, we have very few in our Park. Less than 15 to be exact. We have heard the "reported" number to be 84. That is not correct. So, please know that we are and have to be compliant with this ADA act.

On to a lighter subject. We have three brand new homes now in the park. Number 205 is now ready to be sold and significant progress has been made on number 440 and 162. As soon as one of them is sold, we will be moving on to number 446 and 366, as we outlined in a recent

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shareholder meeting. We are well on our way to having all of our ground covered! We are super excited about that. The entire Board of Directors has worked very hard in the past six months. We have made a lot of improvements, and will continue to do so. Four Seasons is a beautiful community and we should all be proud of it. We will continue to work throughout the summer to make improvements and will anxiously await the return of all our residents and continue to enjoy our permanent residents. ARE YOU LEAVING THE PARK SOON? (Use this as a checklist)

o many things need to be done before you close up your home for the summer. Probably the worse job is emptying the refrigerator! Some folks actually leave their refrigerators plugged in and full of food, just always be mindful that if the power goes off during the summer and items defrost and then refreeze, you should discard everything when you come back in the fall. Better be safe than sorry!

- The second most important thing to remember Be sure to turn off your water.
- Store all outdoor furniture in your shed or porch heavy summer winds can cause items to be blown around.
- Remove fake flowers from your planters they only fade or blow away during hot & windy summer months.
- Take in and store your door mats and park mail pouch. Remove your flag and store away until you come back.
- Be sure to put a change of address/stop delivery with the US Post Office. And tape/tie your mailbox closed.
- If you have the newspaper delivered be sure to call them and give a stop date.
- Store your garbage and recycle buckets in your shed.
- Make arrangements for your planter to be weeded and shrubs trimmed while you are away. Notify the office with the name and phone number of the person/company who will take care of the weeds.
- Give a trusted neighbor a house key and ask them to check on your place once a month. Always good to have someone watching over things while you are away.
- Be sure to lock your windows and doors and shed door.
- Don't leave items like landscape lights or decorative items in your lawn. Difficult for the lawnmowers to mow around such items. Put your landscape lights in the planters looks nice at night in the summer when folks are out on their evening walk.
- Check your awnings now (before you have to leave) and put new fixtures on them if necessary. Be sure to lower and secure them when you leave. We saw what happened when Hurricane Irma came through two years ago. It's such an easy way to secure your home and hopefully prevent serious damage.

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A BIT OF HISTORY

ight years ago this month, on May 1, 2011, Four Seasons Estates was featured in the (then) St. Pete Times. Full news coverage, photographs, interviews. Why, you might ask.

Well, it was the one month anniversary of the tornado-that-wasn't. That sudden, unpredicted, strange storm, finally designated by the NWS as a straight-line windstorm, had taken out 6 of our homes and significantly damaged numerous others. It was not quite April Fools' Day.

It's March 31, late morning. We've finished our breakfast. The phone rings. "Bob, you'd better get up to the south end of the park" the caller says. "Something terrible has happened." We arrive in the area, and it looks like a war zone. The ground is littered with aluminum – sections of roofs, carports, siding. Coach 483 is sitting sideways in the driveway of lot 484. The occupant, a lady who lives alone, is just climbing out her kitchen door. Other residents are wandering around the area, some dazed, all extremely upset, trying to figure out just what happened.

Soon, the police, fire fighters, paramedics show up, followed by television trucks and reporters wanting to live-broadcast. Later come pickup trucks with occupants wanting to salvage (steal) the aluminum and anything else they can carry away.

They are followed by the Salvation Army and Red Cross.

In cooperation with Largo Police, we remove the interlopers, close all three park entrances, set up police plus resident-volunteers to blockade the entrances 24 hours/day for a few days and nights.

We gather the displaced residents in the clubhouse along with other residents who are offering shelter. We are fed by the Salvation Army folks. Later, we take up a money collection, set up a committee under the Social Club to confidentially administer the funds to those who need it.

The recovery begins. City building inspectors and insurance adjusters arrive. Some homes are deemed repairable. Six others are condemned and ordered removed. Thus began the odyssey of seven vacant lots.

The May newspaper coverage was highly complementary, describing how the park residents came together to help one another in their hour of need. It's what America is all about – neighbor helping neighbor. It's what Four Seasons is all about. Four Seasons then and now: a great place to live.

e careful with your "CONSTRUCTIVE CRITICISM". The Scripture tells us in Proverbs 12:18, "Careless words pierce like a sword, but the tongue of the wise brings healing".

Years ago there was a group of brilliant men at a Midwestern university who seemed to have amazing, creative literary. They were would-be poets, novelists, and essayists. They were extraordinary in their ability to put the English language to its best use. These promising young men met regularly to read and critique each other's work. And critique they did. They were merciless with one another. They dissected the smallest literary expression into a hundred pieces. They were heartless, tough, even mean in their criticism, but they thought they were bringing out each other's best work. Their sessions became such arenas of literary criticism that the members of this exclusive group nicknamed themselves "The Stranglers."

On the other hand, the university's women of literary talent were determined to start a support group of their own, one comparable to "The Stranglers." They called themselves "The Wranglers." They, too, read their works to one another, but there was one significant difference between the two groups. The criticism of the "The Wranglers" was much softer, more positive, more encouraging. In fact sometimes there was almost no criticism at all. Every effort, even the feeblest attempt, was gleaned for some bit to be praised and encouraged.

Years later, the university's alumni office was doing an exhaustive study on the careers of its alumni, when it noticed that there was a great difference in the literary accomplishments of "The Stranglers" as opposed to "The Wranglers." Of all the bright and talented young men in "The Stranglers," not one had made a significant literary accomplishment of any kind. On the other hand, from "The Wranglers" had come six or more successful writers, some attaining national reputation.

Though talent between the two groups was probably the same, and the level of education was not much different, "The Stranglers" strangled, while "The Wranglers" were determined to give each other a boost. "The Stranglers" created an atmosphere of contention and self-doubt. "The Wranglers" highlighted the best, not the worst. As a result, we should be careful with our speech so that our words may not strangle, discourage, or wound others. We should strive so that our tongue may bring help and healing as an example of the grace that is in Jesus Christ.


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
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WHERE IN THE WORLD HAVE YOU BEEN?

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

- 1. If you are the last one out of the pool, always ensure the rope is secured across the pool.
- 2. Everyone is required to wear a cover up to and from the pool and at all times.
- 3. No one should be in pool alone.
- 4. Please shower before entering pool.
- 5. Remove any lotions before going into the pool.
- 6. All persons using the pool shall do so at their own risk.
- 7. Management is not responsible for accident or injury.
- 8. All visitors under 16 years of age are allowed to use the pool only during those times posted at the pool. The posted hours are 11 a.m. until closing as long as they are accompanied by an adult or guardian who assumes responsibility for them. Children under 16 shall obey the rules posted and ensure their behavior does not disturb residents using the pool.
- 9. Green wrist bands must be worn to identify residents and guests.
- 10. No tubes, balls, etc. in the pool area.
- 11. Close and tie umbrellas after use.

Shuffleboard Courts

- 1. No bathing attire. Shoes and shirts required.
- 2. Children and young people must be accompanied by an adult.
- 3. Do not walk on courts at any time.
- 4. Return equipment to its proper place.
