MESSAGE FROM MANAGEMENT

(Editors Note: The following is a reprint of a community flyer that management distributed throughout the park.)

<u>RULE REMINDER</u> - the prospectus and rules state:

- GUESTS: Register your guests with the office
- PETS: Register your pet with the office. 2 Pets per home with a weight limit of 35lbs
- THE MOBILE HOME SITE: The home site shall be kept orderly, neat and free from litter and debris. Mowing, trimming, watering, weeding and general care of lawn and shrubs once every (10) days during the growth season from April through October. All trash containers must be stored out of sight. No mowing is permitted on Sunday's.
- THE MOBILE HOME: No storage is permitted on CARPORTS and around the outside of the home. Only furniture specifically designed for outside use and in good useable condition is allowed outside the home. The items must be kept to a reasonable limit.
- 12 FOOT RIGHT OF WAY: Nothing can be planted or built except a private walk way to the front door within the 12' between the road and the front of the home.
- PAINTING AND PRESSURE WASHING: Homes must be pressure washed and painted to maintain community standards. Any changes to the outside of the home, including paint colors, must be approved by the Community Manager before any work is done.
- SPEED LIMIT: The community speed limit is 15 MPH. Please slow down to help keep everyone safe.
- PARKING: No overnight parking on the streets or around the Clubhouse is permitted. Parking on the grass is prohibited. Please remind your guests.
- PROPER ATTIRE: Proper dress is required while using the recreational areas and in the common areas of the community. Shirts and/or cover ups must be worn to and from the pool area.
- WILDLIFE FEEDING: Do not feed the ducks and stray cats.
- POOL AND SPA: This Pool and Spa area is only open from 7:00AM until DARK. Do not use this area after DARK.

Teach children or grandchildren this important skill

Problem solving is a skill that's valuable throughout your children's lives, from school to their adult careers. You can teach your children how to tackle any problem they're facing by sharing these steps:

- Identify the problem. This is the most important step, and often the most overlooked. Your child can't solve a problem until he or she can state what it is.
- Come up with a list of solutions. Brainstorm possible solutions, even ones that initially seem farfetched. Just keep the ideas flowing.

- Evaluate and learn. How did the solution work? What changes need to be made to make it work better? What would your child try the next time?



Coffee may keep you healthy

s drinking coffee good for you? A recent article on The New York Times website linked to a number of different studies touting the positive effects of caffeine on several different health problems. They include:

- Liver damage. A review of data collected by studies of more than 430,000 people found that coffee may lower the risk of cirrhosis of the liver, a disease associated with overindulgence in alcohol (among other causes).
- Tinnitus. Researchers kept track of more than 65,000 women and found that those who drank more than one 8-ounce cup of coffee a day were less likely to suffer from tinnitus, that persistent ringing or buzzing in your ears.
- Auto crashes. A study of truck drivers who routinely work on long hauls found that coffee drinkers (or consumers of other caffeinated drinks) seem 63 percent less likely to be involved in crashes while driving.
- Melanoma. An analysis of health and dietary data involving more than 400,000 people ages 50-71 found that those who drank four or more cups of coffee a day were 20 percent less likely to develop skin cancer. (The researchers cautioned that avoiding exposure to the sun's ultraviolet rays is still the most important way to avoid melanoma.)

Get more from your to-do list

to-do list can help you organize your time and energy effectively, but successful people know that it's just a start, not an end in itself. Get the greatest impact from your list by following this advice:

- Start the night before. Instead of making your list in the morning, finish your day by planning tomorrow's work. You'll arrive fresh and ready to tackle your most important tasks right away.
- Keep it short. A list of 100 items is intimidating. Limit your to-do lists to tasks that add maximum value to your organization, not routine busywork.
- **Prioritize your tasks.** Don't list items at random. Decide which job to tackle first, second, and third so you don't waste time on less important tasks.
