From your Board of Directors

Board of Directors meeting was held on November 20, 2015. The following items were discussed and approved: two CDs matured, one on 09/19/15 and a second on 10/25/15 both were reinvested; Several projects were completed during the summer months totaling \$42,294 utilizing our reserve account; additionally projects utilizing \$20,148 from our Capital account; and a contract with Billings Pump Services to clean and service our lift station at \$75 per month. Our financial report for the month of September 2015 shows that income for the month was \$38,410 with expenditures of \$34,320. The financial statement for each month is posted on the bulletin board at the rear of the hall for everyone to review.











Just a Reminder from the Board of Directors:

During the summer our community experienced a few incidents with unauthorized guest in our club house and pool area. Thankfully we only lost food and a few items from our emergency kit in the kitchen. However, this could have had a different result. Several members of our community voiced their concern of safety. After discussions with the police, the Board scheduled a "town hall meeting" where over forty residents attended. During this meeting Officer Donna Saxton provided information on incidents that have taken place in the surrounding community. She also showed a film on how to identify possible safety issues and how to report them to the police. Group discussions suggested we consider added security measures. As a result of these discussions, the Board ordered the installation of special magnetic locks to the doors in the club house and the pool area. These new locks require the use of special KEY FOBs to enter and exit the pool area. Key FOBs will also be needed for entry into the club house after normal working hours and weekends. Hopefully, these new security measures will allow only members of our community the use of our facilities. Returning residents will be provided KEY FOBs and instructions on their use when they check in at the office.

To all smokers, PLEASE DO NOT DISCARD cigarette butts on the ground as we have had several complaints reporting finding cigarette butts on the road and in the pool area. We all work hard on keeping Golden Gate a beautiful place to live, your assistance would be greatly appreciated.

Additionally, smoking is not permitted in the pool area!

Parking Request


- Airline choice. United? American? Southwest? Forty-five percent of participants said that airline mile redemption was a factor in choosing which airline to fly on.

- Worries. Lost luggage is one thing, but 21 percent of survey participants said that terrorism is their biggest concern when traveling with their families. That was followed by getting lost or separated (19 percent) and crime (19 percent).



Moo! Cows may be smarter than you think


hat's the smartest animal you can think of? Dolphins and chimpanzees may spring to mind quickly, but don't neglect one often-overlooked farm animal: the cow.

College students at the University of Sydney (as reported by the Huffington Post) conducted experiments with dairy cows and found that our bovine friends are capable of quickly mastering a maze to find food, and thus may possess better problem-solving skills than previously known.

The cows were tested in a T-shaped maze similar to those used with mice and rats. They learned to follow a sound through the maze to get to their food, with

one of them reaching its goals within the first 20 seconds of the test.

The results suggest that cattle farmers could train cows to obey specific sound signals to come in for milking, producing greater efficiency on dairy farms.



Global warming, not Ice Age, may have killed mammoths

iant wooly mammoths roamed the Earth until about 11,000 years ago, when they abruptly went extinct. For years, scientists theorized that they were killed by the cold temperatures of the last Ice Age. Now some believe the explanation is just the opposite: The extinction event was caused by a sudden warming event known as an interstadial.

> According to research published in the journal Science, DNA studies of ancient animals point to the sudden extinction of many large species in past ages. As more DNA from fossils became available, and carbon dating methods improved, scientists discovered that the wipeouts didn't correspond to the rise of glaciers and cold weather, but rather to periods of rapid global warming.

> > Early humans also contributed to the demise of the mammoths and other large beasts, but the evidence suggests that climate change was a major factor in their extinction—raising concerns about the future of our present environment.
