

ontinuing to try to clear up some confusion on the workings of the HOA, I will explain two Committees formed one month after the election of officers and directors.

A Negotiating Committee is formed to handle any agreements, contracts, etcetera with the owners of the park. This includes rent increases and Rules & Regulations. Under FS723, within 30 days after the receipt of the rental increase notice or change in the Rules & Regulations, the HOA may submit a request for a meeting to discuss the particular notice. This Committee consists of the President, Vice President, the Association attorney when necessary, and two (2) other paid-up members of the Association selected by the Board with the advice and consent of the membership.

The **Liaison Committee** shall be the only spokesperson for the Association in all discussions between the Association and the park owners or management with the exception of the Negotiating Committee. All matters brought to this Committee shall be in writing and signed, provided that complainants names are not to be made known unless that person so desires. This Committee shall report to the members on any progress or lack of progress in its meetings with the park owners or management. This Committee shall be composed of the President, Vice President and one other Director as appointed by the Board. The President from the preceding year shall act as an advisor to the Committee for one year.

Prior to today we always called our activities leader Chairperson or Manager, giving the indication that they are totally responsible for everything connected to a proposed event. NOT TRUE. This person is a collector of information gathered, someone to guide and support the people that come to our meetings each month. THIS IS A TEAM EFFORT, we sometimes think it is a one person show.

In the past year, we have had 5 people step up as activities director, they did not receive the support of the community and sometimes members. As a team, we have knowledge that must be shared with everyone that will move us forward and pull people together.

We meet the 1st Saturday of each month at 10AM. Everyone is welcome to attend and help create a movement in 2017

This is only the beginning process, now we must find people willing to help work the programs, whether as a TEAM LEADER or a VOLUNTEER doing set up, cooking, clean up, decorating, and more.

I have so much to express about possible changes, but they do not allow me to use all the space in the media. Help me, Help the Team make 2017 a great year.

Ladies Lunch Bunch



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
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Men's Monthly Breakfast

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Spotlight on resident, Mason Day, Lot 263

Jou may have noticed a tall, very slender fellow who wears glasses, meandering around the west side of the park on Bermuda, Kingston, or Trinidad. You will usually see his little poodle, Bentley trailing right behind his footsteps. Mason attends a lot of our activities and goes to the pool most every afternoon late in the day. He also rides around in his golf cart so you may spot him stopping to chat with others in the park. If you catch him going to or from the pool, he'll have his beach towel draped around his neck. Nothing shy about him, he is very friendly and never meets a stranger.

Mason was born and grew up in Jacksonville. You probably won't find many others in the community who are Florida natives. After high school, he joined the Marine Corps for two years and upon discharge began attending college in Gainesville on the GI bill. After losing his driver's license due to driving a little fast, he moved to Homestead, FL to live and work with an aunt and uncle who had an assortment of job opportunities available to him. They owned lime, avocado and mango groves, a feed and seed warehouse, a general store that became the local post office, many rental properties, an interior decorating service, buildings leased to the ancillary support



services of the interior decorating industry; i.e. upholstering, refinishing, drapery making, painters, framers, etc. He began working in their groves and rental property maintenance and later began to assist in his aunt's interior decorating services. He remained there for six years, helping with deliveries and assisting with all the ancillary services her customers in the Miami area needed. His aunt eventually turned her complex into the precursor of today's antique malls. Her complex became known as Cauley Square and it prospered well until Hurricane Andrew damaged all the buildings by removing most of the roofs, forcing the vendors to exit in search of dry dwellings to operate their businesses. She passed away not long after that in her 80s.

In 1980, Mason began looking for change and another place to try out and decided to move to York, PA, where another aunt and uncle lived. His uncle was the Conductor of the York Symphony Orchestra and the Director of Music at the York College of Pennsylvania's Music Department; furthermore, his aunt assisted in public relations for the symphony orchestra. Mason was able to return to college there for only the cost of books since his uncle was an instructor, and earned his degree in Psychology. He met his wife there and has been married for thirty four years, but is now separated. They do not have any children. He has an older sister and two younger brothers, all whom live in Jacksonville. Both his parents lived to be in their eighties.

Mason's career in Psychology has been quite varied. He was a counselor at an alcohol and drug treatment center. He worked at an adolescent outpatient center as

a substance abuse counselor. He moved to Baltimore, Maryland to an impatient adolescent center where he developed an Intensive Outpatient and a Continuing Care Program. Then he got into marketing and outreach services in Baltimore and later nationally. He has spent 30+

years in counseling, substance abuse and psychiatry industries and has enjoyed it immensely. He has lots of stories he could tell about his varied experiences.

His interests are computers, fishing, swimming in our pool, photography, socializing, and walking his dog Bentley. He loves art, antiques, nice furniture and nice rugs. He enjoys bicycling, travel, and the water. Many sports interest him-football, tennis, track, cross country, and ice skating. He competed in triathlons when he was younger. He is a regular watcher of CNBC, a TV business investment channel and feels both lucky and blessed with his stock market investments and life.

Mason has been friends with Les, a neighbor here in the park for about 35 years, meeting him when they both lived in York, PA. He has another friend of 30+ years in New Port Richey and both of them encouraged Mason to move here. He had grown tired of the cold weather and found Island in the Sun Community to be a beautiful park, with nice ambience and it offers a variety of amenities. In the couple of months since he has been here, he believes the park is moving beyond the problems of the past and is getting a healthier and a more positive outlook.

I asked him where he saw himself in five years and he told me he had been researching some islands and had another friend in Costa Rica who wanted him to come for a visit.

He has some health issues with his back after a number of surgeries and additional lung problems, so he just takes life a day at a time right now. However, Mason is a very optimistic guy and can do whatever he sets his mind to do. He is a fellow who is very educated and easy to talk with, so stop by and visit, or seek him out at the pool or clubhouse and you'll have some interesting conversations.

We are making changes to our operations in order to improve communications throughout the park. The lack of a method for everyone to communicate with its Board of Directors indicates it is time to look to the future. Looking outside at different parks and what they are using indicates the creation of a BLOCK CAPTAIN to help fill this void.

Here is a brief description about the duties of a block captain. Block Captains Duties and Responsibilities

The Block Captains assigned throughout our community are residents who volunteer their time and effort to the community. They are the conduit between the residents and the Board of Directors and the various committees within our homeowners' association. Below are some of the duties they are responsible for:

- Keep Family Data Sheet information up to date as information changes (Phone numbers, email addresses, etc.),
- · Distribute information from the HOA Board of Directors and various HOA Committees to the residents. MEDIA one time a month, Flyers with Special Events.
- Forward questions, issues or complaints from residents to the HOA Board,
- Work directly with the Community Greeter, to meeting and greet the new residents.

Below are some of the things Block Captains are "NOT" responsible for:

- Enforcement of HOA covenant restrictions. Residents can report items to the Block Captains and they will forward this information to the HOA Board for appropriate action.
- Knowledge of the general well-being or health of residents within their block of responsibility. This is a private matter between the residents and their family and friends.
- General bad behavioral traits of residents within their block. If residents have an issue with a neighbor or someone on their block, they should either confront the neighbor directly or if the situation is getting out of hand, call local police.
- Any security issues (i.e., break-ins, thefts, vandalism, solicitors, unauthorized fishing, etc.) should be reported to the local law enforcement agency and the HOA Board. However, this information to the HOA Board can be passed thru the Block Captains to the Board of Directors.

Please consider becoming an important part of our team.

They go to a big house called a "wrecked hall". But if it was wrecked they got it fixed up because it's all right now. They play games and do exercises there, but they don't do them very good.

There is a swimming pool there. They go in and just stand there with their hats on. I guess they don't know how to swim. As you go into their park, there is a doll hose with a little man sitting in it. He watches all day so they can't get out without him seeing them. When they can sneak out, they go to the beach and pick up shells that they think are dollars.

My Grandma used to bake cookies and stuff, but I guess she forgot how. Nobody cooks. They just eat out. They all eat the same thing every night, "early birds". Some of the people are so retarded they don't know how to cook at all, so my Grandma and Grandpa bring food to the wrecked hall. They call it "potluck".

My Grandma says Grandpa worked all his life and earned his retardment. I wish they would move back up here, but I guess the little man in the doll house won't let them out.

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
