Bread Pudding Recipe

- 6 slices of day old bread
- 2 Tbsp. melted butter
- 1/2 cup raisins or craisins
- 4 beaten eggs
- 2 cups milk
- 3/4 cup white sugar
- 1 tsp cinnamon
- 1 tsp vanilla

Spray 8" square pan with not stick spray. Break up bread slices into 1" pieces and place in pan. Pour melted butter over bread.

In mixing bowl whisk eggs, milk, sugar and vanilla. Pour half of this mixture over bread and press down with a fork to cover all of the bread.

Pour the remaining half of mixture over bread. Sprinkle with cinnamon.

Bake in pre-heated oven at 350 degrees for 45 min. 12 servings

S aturday Morning Market: Perhaps the granddaddy of area farmers markets, St. Pete's Saturday Morning Market Shop has everything from organic honey to freshly picked fruits and vegetables to baked goods. Artists offer colorful hand-woven baskets, pottery, jewelry and original clothing for sale, while live music and prepared food vendors add to the fun. It's held at the Al Lang Field parking lot at the corner of First Avenue South and First Street from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturdays from early October to late May.

A post season version is open during the summer at Williams Park (330 Second Avenue North, St. Petersburg).

Other Weekly Markets: Buy fresh local produce and more, six days a week at any of these downtown farmers markets:

Tuesdays / Gulfport (year round)

Wednesdays / Clearwater (October - May)

Thursdays / Safety Harbor (November - May)

Fridays and Saturdays / Dunedin (mid-October - June, Saturdays only in July)

Saturdays / Largo (late September - May)

Sundays / St. Pete Beach (October - May)

Safety Harbor / hosts a summertime farmers market every third Saturday from June to September.

Festivals & Music

Sunsets at Pier 60: A Clearwater Beach favorite, Sunsets at Pier 60 features street performers, artisans, music, small rides and, of course, one of the most spectacular sunsets on the Gulf Coast. The family-friendly celebrations start two hours before sunset every day and last until two hours after. There's no better way to end a beautiful day at the beach or kick off an evening

Spotlight on II TS Residents - Gene and Lee Ecker, #145

This couples' resume reads like a long rap sheet, only the list contains all good things, nothing bad. They are the ultimate givers to their community, whether it is in Wisconsin, New York, Connecticut, Florida, their church, their outside activities, and of course, Island in the Sun. Let me try to start at the beginning - which was awhile back since Gene is almost 91 and Lee is 89.

They both went to the same high school in Wisconsin but didn't know each other. Lee's father was in charge of industrial arts. Gene was assigned to him for clerical work. Gene (the *...continued on page 17*





sly devil) dated several young ladies but always thought Lee was above him since her father was a teacher and coach. He eventually took a chance and asked her out. He was surprised that she said yes. They were married in 1945 which I calculate out to 69 years. Do you think it might last?

After high school graduation, which was during the Depression, Gene was offered a job by Kimberly Clark in New York for \$50 a week, which was a lot of money in those days. He went to New York and learned that he would only get \$28 weekly so he had to come back home. He joined the Army but was only in for six months due to a defective eye. He said his fame to claim in the Army was that he worked the Wabash River flood.

Gene went on to quite an illustrious career as a claims examiner, office manager, personnel director, project analyst, assistant manager, manager, director - you get the picture. At one time he was the Managing Director of a \$1 billion pension fund for American Can Company and Secretary of the Connecticut Annuity Bank. They wanted him to come to New York. Gene and Lee were hesitant since their town of Menasha, Wisconsin had a population of about 20,000 while New York City has about 10 million. They moved temporarily into an apartment (with three children). The problem was that the apartment did not have a kitchen. They made arrangements with a corner drug store to pack school lunches for the children. Gene was always the first one to work and the last one to leave - probably the reason he was always being promoted. His work, as well as vacations, allowed him and often Lee to travel to other countries, including Japan, the United Kingdom, Germany, France, Italy, Puerto Rico, and Austria. In Gene's capacity as Corporate Director of Benefits, he negotiated with the United Steelworkers of America and the Papermakers' Union.

Gene and Lee have two daughters, one son, seven grandchildren, and 16 great grandchildren. Their son has retired as a superintendent of schools and a coach and spends some of his time in Fort Myers, Florida, as well as visiting his parents. Lee said there are some great grandchildren that they have not seen since they no longer can travel.

Lee was involved with the Girl Scouts. She was also an Elder in her church, sang in the church choir, and she was involved with the church "Handy Helper" program where they cleaned, did yard work, or whatever the church needed. Gene was also in a church choir for 76 years, was a soloist in the choir, and an Elder and delivered communion. He has been President of two churches.

Their involvement with IITS is every bit as varied as all of their other life activities. They bought their first home on Bermuda in 1989 and have lived full time in their current location since 1995, which is the only three-section home in our park. Lee was the librarian for IITS for two different terms. She was excellent at her job and everyone praised her library skills. Gene has served on the Board of Directors for the HOA, the Co-Op, and the Corporation. He was also a Parliamentarian for the HOA.

They have some close friends in the park that they socialize with and go out to lunch/brunch/ dinner. You get the idea. They travel to the beach several times a week for their walks. They are very valuable to our community and have been silent contributors in many ways. I am proud to call them a friend and acquaintance. We are so fortunate to have such giving people that reside here.




