

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

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

Mystery of the missing Martian methane

It's a mystery—what happened to the methane on Mars? Science Magazine reports that in 2004, the Martian Express orbiter detected signs of methane in Mars' atmosphere. In 2014, the Curiosity rover observed a methane spike in Gale crater that lasted several months, and a few years later Curiosity detected a small seasonal cycle of methane eruptions in the Martian northern hemisphere.

Some scientists doubted the findings. The European Space Agency sent the Trace Gas Orbiter up, arriving in the red planet's orbit in 2016. Although some issues with the readings remain to be cleared up, researchers report that they haven't found any methane at all.

What happened? No one knows, but the Trace Gas Orbiter will keep reporting data until 2022, so maybe scientists will be able to solve the mystery after all.

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These drawing games can spur your brain

Prawing can spur your creativity. You don't have to be a Picasso. Just try some of these games with your friends (from the My Modern Met website):
The Exquisite Corpse. In this game, developed by the 20th-century Surrealist artists, one person begins a drawing at the top of a sheet of paper, then folds it over or covers it up so only a bit of the bottom is showing. The next person continues the drawing, folds it down, and so on. Unfolding it to reveal the completed drawing should produce surprises, laughs, and even some ideas.

• Paper Telephone. One person writes a short, descriptive phrase on a piece of paper, then passes it to the next. He or she then draws a picture based on the phrase. The next person looks only at the picture and then writes a phrase or sentence describing it. The following person then draws a picture of that phrase, and so on. By the end, the final picture and the original phrase may have nothing to do with each other.

• Blind Contour. In this exercise you (and a partner) draw something around you, but without looking at the paper—just the subject of your drawing. Keep your pen or pencil on the paper at all times. You might be surprised at what you see.

• Scribbles. One person scribbles on a piece of paper, eyes closed. The next person has to turn that doodle into a drawing. This forces your mind to make sense of nonsense.

A simple exercise for imagination

our subconscious mind can help you exercise your imagination. Try this technique (used by Thomas Edison):

Ten minutes before you go to sleep, organize your thoughts. Think about a problem you're trying to solve, or ask your brain a question. Keep thinking about this as you drift off to dreamland. Then, during the first 10 minutes after waking up, write down whatever pops into your head. You'll often find that your brain has answered your question during your sleep. In the morning your mind is looser, and you're more likely to remember dreams and connect them to your daytime reality.
