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Ancient bones offer clues to evolution

cientists may have discovered a new human ancestor to go along with "Lucy," the 3.2 million-year-old Australopithecus afarensis female from eastern Africa. Dubbed "Little Foot" because of his small bones, this specimen was unearthed in South Africa in the early 1990s. His skeleton was almost completely preserved after falling down a narrow cave shaft and dying there. Whether Little Foot was a relative of Lucy's or a different pre-human species has been a subject of debate among anthropologists, but a new dating process suggests that Little Foot lived and died some 3.67 million years ago, close to the same time as Lucy.

Although some scientists dispute the accuracy of the dating technique, if it holds up it suggests an evolutionary link between different species of Australopithecus in ancient Africa, as well as evidence of where in Africa modern humans began to develop.

Birds do it, bees do it, and so do amorous mice

rom time immemorial, men have wooed their lady loves with romantic (if sometimes off-key) music. Now scientists from Duke University believe that love songs aren't just for humans. Mice also sing to females they hope to attract, although they aren't likely using Barry White.



Instead, mice rely on high-pitched sounds outside the range of human hearing, using specific tunes when they smell a potential mate and different ones when they finally set eyes on her. The songs are louder and composed of more complex sounds when they smell a female scent, and get simpler—but longer—when they finally meet face to face. The complex songs seem to attract females, although what specifically draws them close is still uncertain.

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Support innovation with continuous learning

he more you learn, the more material you have for your creative efforts. To master lifelong learning, no matter what your ambitions are, consider these points from the Innovation Excellence website:

- Laughter is good for the brain. Find the humor in whatever you do. Laughter will help you remember incidents better, and also generate a sense of security which supports a well-balanced mind.
- Learn in chunks. Instead of trying to memorize information in big blocks, concentrate on learning a few individual points at a time. You'll retain more without the mental exhaustion of cramming.
- Study a foreign language. Bilingual speakers tend to process information more efficiently than those who speak only one language. People who exercise their brains by learning Spanish, Japanese, or some other tongue frequently find they don't have to work as hard performing other cognitive tasks.

Doctors may soon use lasers to seal wounds

asers are common weapons in science fiction movies, but soon a laser may be used to heal wounds in real life if scientists at Tel Aviv University are successful.

As reported on the Reuters website, the scientists developed optical fiber capable of transmitting infrared light and at the same time measuring the heat of the tissue it's pointed at. This allows them to control the laser's power accurately and use it to "weld" tissue effectively without any burning or scarring. Collagen aids the bonding process, growing firm as the skin cools down.

This laser-aided process may result in stronger bonding with fewer scars than traditional suture offers. Initial tests on humans showed successful healing with less scar tissue; examinations one year after surgery should demonstrate whether the laser produces less scarring than needle and thread.

Twin suns may support rocky worlds—in theory

any solar systems around the universe are binary, with two stars orbiting each other in space. Scientists have long believed that rocky planets can't form in these systems because of gravitational forces that would cause planetesimals (worlds in the process of forming) to destroy themselves in collisions instead of slowly merging with each other. Thus, the common image of a world with two (or more) sunsets on the horizon seemed relegated to movies.

But new studies suggest that planetesimals behave differently than had been thought, according to the Sci-News website. Astronomers previously theorized that small worlds seek a circular orbit, leading to collisions around binary stars; now they believe that planets in these systems may take on an oval orbit as they form, avoiding crashes and eventually accumulating a rocky mass. Such worlds could see more than one sun in the sky, and may be able to support life.

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
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
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


The state of food across the U.S.

That do professional artists, writers, and performers think about creativity? From The Guardian come these thoughts on the process from people who depend on their imagination to do their jobs:

- Guy Garvey, musician. "Just start scribbling. The first draft is never your last draft. Nothing you write is by accident."
- Polly Stenham, playwright. "I'm very fidgety, and I seem to work best when my hands are occupied with something other than what I'm thinking about. During rehearsals, I find myself drawing little pictures or symbols that are somehow connected to the play."
- Tamara Rojo, ballet dancer. "An idea never comes to me suddenly; it sits inside me for a while, and then emerges."
- Mark-Anthony Turnage, composer. "If you get overexcited by an idea, take a break and come back to it later. It is all about developing a cold eye with which to look over your own work."
- Fyfe Dangerfield, musician. "For me, the image of the tortured artist is a myth—you don't need to be miserable to write songs. In fact, if I am feeling down, the last thing I want to do is write; though it's important sometimes just to sit down and get on with it, however you're feeling. Your creativity is like a tap: if you don't use it, it gets clogged up."

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Eliminate the obstacles to a good night's rest

good night's sleep is essential to everyone's health, and yet many people have trouble getting the shut-eye they need. If you're not waking up feeling refreshed and ready to start your day with energy, check out these problems that may be preventing you from sleeping soundly:

- Procrastination. You know you should go to bed, but you let yourself get distracted by household tasks or the TV. Set a firm time limit on your evening and stick to it.
- Caffeine. Avoid coffee and other caffeinated drinks after 3 p.m. The effects can linger for up to seven hours, making sleep difficult by the time you need to go to bed.
- Heat. You may not be sweating, but feeling just a little too warm can keep you from dropping off. Try sticking one foot out from under the covers to balance the temperature.
- Stress. The news, your job, or personal worries can make relaxation and sleep difficult. Practice meditation and other techniques to un-tense your body and your mind.
- Work. If your job starts too early in the morning, you'll have trouble waking up and performing well. Try to negotiate a later arrival time. Emphasize how your productivity will increase if you get the right amount of rest.

Prevent back pain before it strikes

Back pain can make your work difficult no matter what job you do. Lifting heavy items is only one potential source of damage; poor posture and repetitive movements can also cause strain and pain. Keep your back in good shape with these general tips from the Mayo Clinic website:

- Get some exercise. Losing weight and staying in shape will decrease wear and tear on your back muscles. Combine aerobic activity with strength training that stretches and strengthens your stomach and back.
- Practice good posture. Your parents were right when they told you to stand up straight. Make a point of keeping your weight balanced on both feet without slouching. Use a chair with good back support, and make sure it's the right height, allowing you to keep both feet flat on the floor and your knees on the same level as your hips.
