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






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TREASURERS REPORT.

- ✓ Mortgage pay down account now stands at \$674,000.00
- ✓ A members vote will be held in the near future concerning changing the reserve account bookkeeping method from the component method to the pooling method. If approved, the office will eventually eliminate the need for two bookkeeping methods.
- ✓ The geothermal system was paid for with Reserve Funds and the new aerator for the lake will also be paid for from Reserve Funds. This created surplus funds that allowed us to fully fund the 2015 Reserve Account.

There will be no additional cost for Brighthouse house digital customers and a \$2.00 per month increase for Basis service customers (if they want the Park Channel). Currently approximately 60% of park residents use Brighthouse for their TV cable company. If our law firm approves the agreement, Brighthouse will pay a signing bonus of \$7,000.00 to the R.O. Association. A Motion was made; to send the agreement to the park law firm for their review

Motion passed 6 yes 2 no. Director Sue Stevens voted No and Director Wimmer abstained.

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

HIGHLIGHTS FROM MARCH 5 WORKSHOP

- ✓ *The Park Lawyer has reviewed the Brighthouse contract recently negotiated by the Communications Committee. The contract is slated for further review by the committee.
- ✓ Director Lapointe thanked Rita St Laurent for assisting the park manager with the preparation of a Proxy ballot concerning the Reserve Account bookkeeping method.
- ✓ Director Sue Stevens reported on the Park Insurance coverage review. The effort will identify items we insure but are in fact excluded from coverage.
- ✓ Assistant Treasurer Susan Zerbe suggested that all Board Members should be involved when deciding which funds should be transferred to cover Operating Expense shortfalls. Currently, just the Treasurer makes those decisions. Treasurer Rhodes agrees with the suggestion.
- ✓ A large section of sewer pipes will soon require sleeving. A plumbing firm is currently costing out the job. This work must be done before any major road upgrades are started.
- ✓ Buildings and Grounds Chairman Bowman reported that a study is underway to determine what process will be used to resurface our pool.
- ✓ Sales and Marketing Chair Susan Zerbe reported that two homes are under contract pending a sale.
- ✓ The Park Manager is costing out SPEED HUMPS due to vehicles continued speeding within the park.
 - ✓ New home installation on Lot #97 is underway.
- ✓ An engineering firm is being consulted to assist planning for major park road upgrades in 2018.
 - ✓ Director Zerbe suggested purchasing 10 additional chairs for the pool deck. 5 loungers

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and 5 regular chairs.

- ✓ The Board thanked the Social Club organizers for the popular Island "hole in one" and Corn Hole Toss Tournaments held recently.
- ✓ President Duclow reminded Directors that all motions and items for the agenda must be submitted to the office on Fridays before the Thursday meetings.
- ✓ Vice President Dennis Lapointe reported on the recent Social Club income and expense records submitted for individual clubs. Some park clubs are holding several thousand dollars in their individual accounts. State law prohibits organizations holding large sums unless they get a tax number and file tax forms. All funds must be accounted for, clubs are not entitled to "save up" extra money without proper tax filing. If an audit finds this law being broken, the R.O. Board will be held accountable. Director Lapointe suggested clubs holding large sums of money may want to contribute to the purchase of an upgraded sound system for the clubhouse. Past Secretary reported that some clubs are holding money in personal banking accounts which is illegal. This issue will be studied further by the Board.

A letter has been received from Past Treasurer Bob Greer requesting more clarity on financial matters. The Board will reply and work out times when Mr. Greer can go to the office to review past and present financial documents.

BOARD RESERVE WORKSHOP DRAWS CROWD

n Wednesday evening, March 4th, the Resident Owners Board of Directors held an informative review of the Park Reserve funds and accounting methods. Treasurer Dusty Rhodes and Assistant Treasurer Susan Zerbe led the workshop which consisted of a Power Point presentation with updates on reserve account totals. Following a second Professional Reserve Study last year, the Directors have decided to change over from the Component method of handling reserves to the pooling method. The study discovered an overwhelming majority of Florida's Resident owned communities currently use the pooling method. The change will result in the eventual elimination of maintaining Reserve Funds within two separate bookkeeping methods. The State of Florida maintains a number of checks and balances to oversee proper handling of Reserve monies. A Question and answer period helped to clear up any outstanding questions from the audience. Treasurer Rhodes also offered to meet privately with anyone who needs more specific information. As required by statute, a proxy ballot will be circulated soon to all certificate holders asking for their approval of the changeover.


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HIGHLIGHTS MARCH R.O. MEETING




