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HIGHLIGHTS JANUARY 2016 R.O. BOARD MEETING

4 Candidates throw hats in ring



- L to R; Dick Duclow, Gerry Killham, Rita St. Laurent and Warren Bowman are running for the 3 seats on the R.O. Board.
- ❖The invocation was given by Director Susan Zerbe and the Pledge of Allegiance was led by President Duclow.
- ❖ V.P. Dennis Lapointe read the Park Mission and Vision Statements.
- ❖ An open forum was offered but no one spoke.
- ❖ The 4 candidates for 3 Board positions spoke briefly about their particular qualifications. (See photo above).
- ❖ Minutes were approved as amended and circulated.
- There was No Correspondence.
- ❖ Managers Report; ***There will be an OPEN HOUSE event on Sunday January 24th. ***The manager reported on several homes which need either a good washing or in some cases a painting. Please take care of these matters before any open house. ***Smokers are requested to use the proper disposal containers for their BUTTS. ***The sewer line that services Kimberly Circle has had to be professionally cleaned-out 8 times over the past few years. The problem each time was either used Adult Diapers (DEPENDS) or used SWIFTER floor cleaning pads. These items are not to be placed in the toilet for disposal. They clog things up. Please wrap those items in plastic bags and dispose in the trash.***Placing cooking oils and grease in sink drains is also a problem. Please use a can to place oils and grease in before placing the can in the trash. Don't try to wash this type of waste down your drain or toilet. ***To assist floor cleaners, please check for dropped food items on floor before leaving the clubhouse. ***Overnight Parking on the streets is not allowed. Contact the office for a parking sticker for guests. ***Geo-Tec Engineers continue their grid searches for underground erosion problems. ***Some SOLAR lighting is being tested at the front entrance and also on the island. ***If you detect the odor of gas, notify the office. We still have a 1000 gallon propane tank in use behind the Security Cart Shed. ***A 6 foot depression developed behind lot #88 on January 14, Geo Tec will investigate. ***Director Myron Paris suggested the office prepare a hand out for all residents warning about the problem of flushing DEPENDS and or SWIFTER pads down the sewer. Manager Beth Carroll replied this was already in the planning stages.
- ❖ Financial Report by Asst. Treasurer Susan Zerbe. The report was given using graphs on the large screen TV set. The 2015 budget came in with a surplus. The Board Treasurer will make a recommendation following Park elections on how best to use the surplus funds. Director Zerbe reported the Mortgage Pay down Account now stands at \$835,236.00. There

were a series of question from a resident concerning how the Mortgage Pay Down is funded and how it will be spent. Treasurer Dusty Rhodes gave a detailed explanation of how the fund was started and also asked Mike Bouvette to stand and be recognised for his role in Co-Chairing the 2011 Economic Study Group findings. This group was made-up of park residents, they studied all aspects of park finances including the question of how to best prepare for the Mortgage renewal in 2018. Some 600 hours were involved in the study. The pay down fund is added to regularly by adding the principal amount of Loan Payments (from residents who are financing their share). The pay down account has always been earmarked to use against the mortgage when it is renewed. However, the R.O. Board has discretion to use funds as needed at that time. Unforeseen circumstances may dictate that some of those funds be directed elsewhere to eliminate an assessment for a major project. All our accounting methods follow the guidelines put forth by Florida statutes. Treasurer Rhodes them mentioned that the unknown extent of sewer repair costs may affect our Reserve Account contributions. This matter will be studied in the New Year and we may have to redo some thinking about the results of the latest Reserve study. Mike Bouvette commented that \$50,000.00 was removed from cash reserves to fully fund the Reserve Account, why was this done. Treasurer Rhodes replied that all projections that pertain to mortgage rates indicate the park will have a substantially lower mortgage payment in 2018. This will create a budget surplus which will be used to repay the cash reserves without increasing the maintenance fee. However, the R.O. Board of the day will make the final decision as to how to use the surplus.

- ❖ New Business, Park Manager submitted a request to hire a plumbing firm to clean, jet and video problem areas in our sewer lines. A motion was made to do the work at a cost not to exceed \$3,000.00. Motion Passed Unanimously. Ms. Carroll also reported that resident Bruce DeWaters (retired road builder) has offered to help prepare a master plan of how best we will approach the road repaving project. Bruce has indicated that prior to any paving, when road depressions are discovered they must be dug up and backfilled, then given a year to settle before paving. Therefore the manager has suggested starting the pre-paving depression repairs in 2018 and letting the repairs settle before starting a major road repaving project in 2020. A motion was made to that effect. Motion passed unanimously. Bruce has also recommended not spending the \$70,000.00 for top sealing the roads as that does little to improve their condition.
- Suggestion from Director Rhodes that a study begin to see what if any adverse effects would accrue if the Board term was reduced from three years to two years. The Board will study that suggestion.
- ❖ Safety and Security Chairperson Sue Stevens reports many residents and guests continue to drive the wrong way around the lake and ignore STOP signs and NO LEFT turn signs. She also commented on golf cart speeding. Director Stevens made a motion that all golf carts be required to have a 4" number sticker on front and back. Number Stickers will be provided by the office at no cost to the cart owner. Motion Carried unanimously. Issuing Number Stickers will also be considered for all residents cars. The numbers will allow Security Cart volunteers to report driving infractions to the office. The Manager will issue warnings and repeat offenders will be issued sanctions against their units.

- Director Dennis Lapointe announced that a letter has gone out to the Social Club and all ancillary clubs that require regular financial reports be submitted for future audits. Included was also a warning against co-mingling funds. Individuals will now be liable for misplaced funds etc.
- ❖ Director Susan Zerbe reports the Long Range planning survey was a success. 444 people are living in the park and the survey offered an overview of what was needed and or wanted within the community. A copy of the survey summery will be made available to all residents.
- ❖ Sales and Marketing Chairman Myron Paris commented on the scheduled open house event. 8 homes are currently for sale. He also commented on the new park TV channel (732) available for Brighthouse customers. It continues to be fine tuned by our office staff.
- ❖ Meeting adjourned at 11:20

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

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A CUP OF COFFEE AND SOME WARM SOCKS

round Thanksgiving time, for the past 4 years, the Bole family (first Dick and now Jean) speak at coffee hour requesting Lake Highlanders purchase and donate new packages of socks for the homeless. 2012 saw 275 pair of new sweat socks donated to the effort. 2013 the donations reached 375 pair and last year we broke all records donating 600 pairs of warm comfy socks. Along came 2015, and sadly, the driving force behind the Park sock program had passed away. The tradition was continued by his lovely wife Jean, who stepped to the podium and made an appeal to keep the sock program alive. Park residents came through

and in just a few weeks, donated 776 pair of socks for the homeless.



But, you ask, what becomes of all these socks? Here is where Park Resident Dick Barstow Lot #64 comes into the story. Dick, a Snow Bird from Maine arrived to spend winters here in 2008. While attending local church services, he learned of a Clearwater Soup Kitchen where homeless folks lined up every day to be fed. Dick decided he could help and regularly arrived a little early at the soup kitchen to hand out coffee he had purchased at McDonalds. The coffee went over very well and he noticed many of the men and women who lined up for coffee were not wearing socks. His next trip was to Kmart where he found socks on sale, purchasing as many as his budget allowed, he started handing those out as well. Dick Barstow became a regular at several homeless locations in Clearwater, handing out hot coffee and warm socks. To this day he is affectionately called "THE COFFEE GUY" by Clearwater's homeless community.

Dick Bole learned about Dick Barstow's sock & coffee give-away efforts and suggested he ask Lake Highlanders to help out, and the rest is history. Each Fall a large box appears in the clubhouse and within a few weeks the box is overflowing with

socks, socks and more socks.

This year one of the Park Christmas Luncheon 50/50 draws was won by Joy Adams who promptly donated her winnings to the sock program. Each table at the luncheon then added a few dollars to Joy's winnings. These donations enabled Dick Barstow go shopping at the local Thrift Stores for "hoodie sweatshirt" bargains. He often buys sweat shirts in excellent condition for \$2.00 or less. All are slated to be given away to folks in need this winter. Neighbors continue to help with the program. Linda Read knits warm caps that are very popular and several other neighbors assist with delivery and thrift store shopping. And, every once in a while, someone quietly donates a few dollars to the sock fund.

Dick Barstow continues to be the "Coffee Guy". On the afternoon when the PIPER interviewed him he was making a fresh pot for his 20 cup thermos. When the interview wrapped up, he drove to Clearwater, delivering hot coffee and 20 to 25 pair of socks just like almost every other day. He places sweatshirts in grocery bags and offers them by size, small medium, large etc. The popular late afternoon gifts are very welcome to the more than thankful

group who wait for him. Socks are all put to good use, keeping feet warm and sometimes they are used as mittens. Most will only take one pair as they realize others are in need also. By all accounts his clients prefer dark colors as they wish to remain "invisible".

The Piper asked Dick if he has ever had any problems with his "clients", he responded with a convincing no. He has even had offers to pay a few cents for his hot coffee.

Dick Barstow truly enjoys his volunteering efforts, a retired High School English teacher and coach, he was recently inducted into the Bangor Maine **Basket Ball Coaches Hall of Fame**, and 600 people showed up for the event. Dick Barstow has touched many lives. Oh yes, and by the way, Dick continues his coffee and socks giveaway program all winter, right up until he heads back to his Maine lakeside home for the summer.

Dick Barstow and helpers, Ed MacDonald, Roger Gelin and Sandy & Greg Langille will be at it again next fall and well into the future. The Tradition which started with a few cups of coffee has blossomed into a wonderful helping hand for the unfortunate. The Coffee Guy really started something and the tradition continues.

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
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SPRING ART AND CRAFT FAIR
