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## TRAVELOGUE – THE RINGLING

The Ringling is a historic site and museum located in Sarasota. It is an easy day trip from Lake Highlander. The complex has been under the auspices of Florida State University since 2000 after the state of Florida gave them governance.

John Ringling (1866-1936) was one of five Ringling Brothers who started a small circus in 1884 in Baraboo, Wisconsin. They purchased the Barnum & Bailey Circus in 1907, making it the Ringling Brothers and Barnum & Bailey Circus. John was the advance man and manager

of the circus. He outlived all his brothers and was the wealthiest of the five, due to his many investments.

John's brother, Charles, began purchasing land in Sarasota and in 1911 John and his wife Mable purchased 20 acres of waterfront there. In 1912 they began spending winters in Sarasota. The Ringling's website states that at one time John and Charles owned more than 25% of Sarasota's total area. After Charles' death in 1926, John decided to move the circus' winter headquarters to Sarasota from Bridgeport, Connecticut.

John and Mable began construction on a mansion overlooking the Sarasota Bay in 1924. The building, called Ca' d'Zan, was completed two years later at a cost of \$1.5 million. It is 5 stories tall, 36,000 square feet, and has 41 rooms and 15 bathrooms.

### Ca' d'Zan

Admission to The Ringling is \$23 (seniors) and includes entry to the Museum of Art [a 21-gallery museum featuring the art collected on European tours by the John and Mable] and the Circus Museum. The Circus Museum has a collection of performers' wardrobes, beautiful parade wagons, advertising posters, a circus model, John and Mable Ringling's private Pullman car, a cannon that shot performers across the big top, and much more. A stroll around the beautifully manicured grounds is also a highlight of the site. One Saturday each fall is the Smithsonian Museum's Free Museum Day which gives free admissions to museums all over the country. The Ringling is included. Check the Smithsonian Museum's website to find out which Saturday is the free day. When I last checked the site, it had not been updated to the 2019 date. continued on page 14

For an additional price, one can tour Ca' d'Zan. A self-guided tour through the first floor is an additional \$10. Mable's Tour of Ca' d'Zan, a docent-led tour of the first two floors costs an additional \$20. For an additional \$30 you can take John's Tour of Ca' d'Zan. This docent-led tour takes the visitor throughout areas not included on the regular tour, including the game room, the fourth-floor bedroom, and the Belvedere Tower that provides Sarasota's most spectacular view. We took Mable's Tour and enjoyed the insights it provided into the private life of the Ringlings.

When John Ringling died, he bequeathed his beloved estate and museums to the people of Florida. It is truly a Florida treasure and well worth seeing.

he Friends of the Library met in the library on Monday, January 14. Officers were elected for the coming year. The 2019 officers are: Jan Schultz, President; Lou Collard, Vice-President; Connie Reardon, Secretary; Kay Byrne, Treasurer; Julie Decot, Statistician.

Donations of books are always appreciated for adding to our library holdings. But due to the size of our library we cannot accept books whose publication date is older than ten years. Currently we are accepting books published in 2009 or newer. We also accept jigsaw puzzles, movie DVD's, and audio books on CD.

### LHRO ANNUAL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

- A quorum of 103 members (one membership per coach) was reached.
- President Zerbe announced that we are now 100% resident owned.
- Treasurer Kathy Hartwell said we ended 2018 in a sound financial position with over \$1.3 million in assets and a value of over \$8.4 million. Our financial holdings have been moved to First Citrus Bank.
- Our manager, Beth Carroll, gave the highlights of things accomplished in 2018:
  - o All the benches around the lake were replaced with polywood benches.
  - o The swings around the lake were replaced with polywood gliders.
  - o The park perimeter was enclosed with white vinyl fence.
  - o The tree mulch was replaced with egg rock stone.
  - o The wall on CR 1 was repainted.
  - o A vinyl chair rail was added in the Lanai.
  - o New chairs were purchased for the Lanai.
  - o The pool chairs were re-strapped.
  - o The light globes in the pool area were replaced and LED lighting was added.
  - o A new stop sign was erected next to lot 306.
  - o We have a new trash compactor.
  - o All the ball valves have been identified and repairs were made.
  - o Two new back-up generators were added by the office and library with the needed fuel tanks.
  - o The pipes in the laundry were replaced.
  - o New fencing was erected around the drying yard.
  - o New security cameras were added.
- Sales and Marketing report:
  - o 26 homes sold in 2018.
  - o 1 home is under contract.
  - o 9 homes are for sale.

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o Total sales in 2018 were about \$2 million with an average per home of \$82,500.

- o We have about 60 visitors daily viewing homes on the website.
- Long-range Planning report:
  - o The committee looked at the management style of several other parks.
  - o The committee looked at speed bumps/humps at several other parks.
  - o A survey was sent out and is being evaluated. A report will go to the Board in February.
- The minutes from the 2018 annual meeting were approved as read.
- Open Forum
  - o Lot 92 addressed the issue of speed bumps. He requested that no speed bumps be placed in the park without resident approval. A show of hands indicated support of this proposal.
  - o Lot 244 asked that laundry carts be purchased for the laundry room to assist moving wet clothes to the dryers.
  - o Lot 85 asked about the status of the White Elephant sale considering the coming street repaving. Beth is hoping the street project can be put off until after the sale. She will have a better idea next week.
  - o Lot 154 requested that prayer be a part of the beginning of each Board meeting.
  - o Lot 32 spoke in favor of speed bumps. He sees a lot of vehicles speeding before and after the speed bump in front of his house.
  - o Lot 258 stated that there is a sample of a speed bump from the city of Dunedin. It is designed for safe maneuvering at 15 mph.
  - o Lot 60 stated that our younger residents are looking for physical activities not currently offered in the park. He suggests as examples: Purchase of one of the lots to create a tennis court, at a putting green by the lake, create meandering parks in the wasted space between coaches. He urged the board to consider opportunities that would attract people to our community.
  - o Lot 65 urged the drying lot be updated. It should be paved because the grass is frequently wet and some of the metal holding up the lines is rusted. Another issue is the pool is too cold. The pool maintenance worker said the pool temperature is 78 degrees.
  - o Lot 35 said speed bumps do not slow people down.
  - o Lot 256 said the new stop sign is more dangerous than no stop sign. Without a stop sign she did not expect people to stop. With a stop sign one should expect people to stop but they often do not.
  - o Lot 184, who is on the long-range planning committee, looked at speed bumps at three different parks. She talked to residents and managers. Everyone says, "Don't put in speed bumps."
  - o Lot 131 requests the speed limit be lowered.
  - o Lot 157, a long-range planning committee member, said another park who had put speed bumps in removed them at the cost of \$200,000. The long-range planning committee is not recommending speed bumps.
  - o Lot 212 supports prayer and patriotism at our meetings.

- The meeting was adjourned.
