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

#### HIGHLIGHTS OF DECEMBER R.O. BOARD MEETING

- Chaplain Darlene Johnson offered the invocation and President Warren Bowman led the Pledge of Allegiance.
- It was noted that this portion of the evening would be a MEMBER'S MEETING.
- Ballot Counting Committee Chairman Bob Frazier gathered his team, opened the ballot box and proceeded to count ballots.
- Members Meeting recessed and a Board Meeting convened.
- Correspondence #1, A letter from Director John Cook offering his resignation due to health problems. The resignation was accepted and John was thanked for his many years of service to the community. #2, Letter from Donna Flint Lot #22 contained 3 suggested recommendations for the Board. First, all reports should be circulated before the actual meeting where they will be discussed. Second, Board should check out other accounting firms to see if we are getting a fair price for accounting work. Third, A committee of residents with specific legal and accounting skills should be established to assist the Board. The Board responded that all 3 suggestions had merit. They asked Donna to organize the committee made up of residents with the skills she suggested and bring more specific details on how to proceed to the January R.O. workshop. Donna agreed. Letter #3, The French family, lot #237 sent a lengthy letter asking to be reimbursed for expenses and inconvenience they experience due to paperwork mistakes with a recent park closing. The Board replied they had a legal opinion from the park attorney that they should not offer any reimbursement as the closing eventually was completed; the Board apologized for the long delay while closing the sale. However, they consider the matter closed. Letter #4 was from Office Employee Sharon Shedd, who accepted some blame for the mistakes during the closing but stated they were honest mistakes and noted she had apologized to Mr. and Mrs. French. She feels things like this should be dealt with in private at the office.

<u>Old Business</u>, Director Arthur Duncan made a motion, seconded by Director Susan Zerbe; "Myron Paris, Lot #93 be appointed to fill the balance of John Cook's term". Motion passed unanimously. Past Director Joe Kasprzak swore in Director Paris.


#### **Managers Report**

- Owners who rent their homes for 6 months or less must register and pay a 5% Development Tax. Details are in your tax assessment notice.
- The Sheriff's office reports several phone and computer scams are currently circulating in the area. (Editor's note; see SCAM article elsewhere in this issue)
- The old home on Lot #97 has been removed. Watch for a new home on that lot soon.
- Teenagers visiting the park will be asked to wear an ID. Lanyard. This will eliminate residents asking who they are etc.
- The office has security cameras at the dumpsters. Several residents have been discovered discarding large items without first paying the required fee., (carpet, furniture, TV sets etc). These items require a fee be paid before disposing of them. See office for details.

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- New monthly financial forms have been developed by the Manager to keep Board members up to date with details of income and expenses.
- The Mortgage Pay down account is currently at approximately \$640,000.00.
- The Board is exploring establishment of a Line of Credit when the current park mortgage matures.
- The treasurer reminded the Board that Long range planning should begin soon to decide how best to deal with mortgage issues when the current mortgage is renewed.
- A seminar is being scheduled with the Park accountant and lawyer to brief Directors on recent changes in laws etc.
- Treasurer Rhodes retired the 2013/14 Finance Committee and thanked them for their efforts
- Past R.O. Treasurer Ed Hughes gave current treasurer Robert "Dusty" Rhodes a well deserved thank you for his management of park finances. He commented on Mr. Rhodes hard work and farsightedness, which has resulted in our arrival at such a positive financial position.

#### Sales and Marketing report by Director Susan Zerbe

- 18 homes were sold during 2014
- All closings are now conducted with a Title Company. No more office closings.
- Long Range Planning has begun. Roads, buildings etc are being discussed.
- A subcommittee "COMMUNICATIONS" is being chaired by Barry Adams, Board Rep. Myron Paris.

#### Disaster Planning and Security, Director, Dennis Lapointe

- A request was made for new Neighborhood Watch signs to be posted at each entrance.
- Please call the <u>non emergency help number</u> (727) 582-6177, to report unusual happenings in the park. (Solicitors, people with dogs, teenagers without a ID lanyard etc..) A Sheriff's Deputy will respond.
- Speeding in the park has become a high profile problem.
- Motion by Dennis Lapointe seconded by Warren Bowman, "Lower the park speed limit to 10 MPH". Motion approved unanimously.
- Golf cart operators are reminded to obey the rules of the road. Drive on the correct side of the road etc.
- Bob Frazier brought the voting results to the Board.
- The underfunding of reserves question passed 134 YES to 6 NO.
- Motion by Dusty Rhodes, seconded by Susan Zerbe, The Board accept the 2015 Budget as presented. Motion passed unanimously.
- Board meeting adjourned and the Members meeting reconvened.
- By-law amendments and the Proprietary Lease amendments were passed as follows; 179 ballots were received and 175 voted YES for all changes.
- The meeting adjourned at 9PM.

#### THE STORY OF THE BELL



A BELL WITH HISTORY

That's R.O. Director Dennis Lapointe sitting next to a rather unusual bell used at the Veteran's Day ceremony in November.

Park resident Alice May loaned the chairman of the park's program a very special bell that was rung to mark the 11th hour of the 11th day on the 11th month. It rang loud and clear to help with that very solemn part of the ceremony. What makes this bell so special? Bob Frazier discovered the bell's history and relayed it to the PIPER for everyone to enjoy. During WWII, the bell featured in this article was originally a munitions plant funnel used to add gun powder to bombs. The armed bombs and shells were sent overseas to help win the war. Long after the war, while doing some poking around in an Ohio antique shop, Alice May's late husband Bob

discovered the former funnel and thought it would make a very nice bell. He added a hook at the top and gave it a new coat of paint. When hung by the hook and struck, a sound is emitted "clear as a bell". Thanks to Alice May for the loan of this special World War II artifact and Bob Frazier for uncovering the bell's history.

#### HIGHLIGHTS OF DECEMBER 2014 SOCIAL CLUB MEETING


- 1st. V.P. Joan DuClow chaired the meeting in President Kay Byrne's absence.

- Joan DuClow thanked several residents on behalf of the Social Club; Harold Lewis for

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

- ✓ Here are a few items covered at the December workshop.
- ✓ Why are some Birthday and Anniversary dates missing from PIPER? Answer; the old office computer software is being updated; also several residents have not turned in their PROFILE forms. Contact the office if you find errors or omissions in the Birthday or anniversary listings.
- ✓ Beth has arranged for a local person to maintain weeds and shrubs for snowbirds.
- ✓ Paving quotes are pending for new golf cart parking area at clubhouse.
- ✓ When registering as guests at the office, teenage visitors will be issued an ID Lanyard to identify them and let residents know where they are visiting. This should eliminate those embarrassing questions to kids found walking around the lake..."Who are you and who are you visiting". No ID lanyard tag makes teenagers fair game for questioning.
- ✓ The Park manager asks everyone to NOT adjust the clubhouse sound system controls in the sound cabinet. The sound system is pre-set and does not require additional tuning.
- ✓ All groups using the clubhouse must also clean up after their event,
- ✓ Two new bulletin boards are to be installed in the breezeway between clubhouse and card room. One for Park Business the other for Social events.

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

nnoyed by the persistence of solicitors' unwelcome knocks on the door? It seems like no matter what they do, they always manage to show up Lat your door. They come with fliers, door hangers, a rehearsed speech SOLICITORS and the distinct ability to ignore the polite decline of the products they're peddling—food, cleaning supplies, appliances, cosmetics, magazine subscriptions, home-improvement products, coupons for local businesses and other unwanted items—sometimes even making you feel trapped in your own home. Associations are particularly easy, frequent targets of commercial, religious and political solicitors; part of the appeal is that population density makes our association an easy environment for them to canvas. Because of this, finding a way to keep solicitors away can be invaluable. The simplest way to deter solicitors is by posting a "No Solicitors" sign in your yard, on your door or in your front window. If you get knocks on the door anyway, you also can ask solicitors for their license, permit or company identification; many don't have it and will leave. If the solicitor doesn't leave or keeps coming back, tell them the community has nuisance restrictions and there are legal ramifications for violating them. And if that's not enough to make them high-tail it off of your lawn, you can also call the association office, and ask for the manager or security volunteers to escort the solicitor out of the community. While a visit from a solicitor is often annoying, they can sometimes be more than just a nuisance; some might have ulterior motives, such as fraud, can vassing a home to commit a crime or other unseemly behavior. This is another good reason to keep your doors locked. If you believe a solicitor is acting suspiciously or you feel threatened, call the police immediately 582-6177 and notify our security volunteers. If you would like a list of the park's security volunteers, please visit the office. So stay safe, keep your sanity and do your part in discouraging solicitors from trolling our community. You'll soon hear just how sweet an un-rung doorbell sounds.

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

## Eat right to avoid the flu

It's never too late to protect yourself (and your friends and family) from the flu. A flu shot may be your best line of defense, but you can also keep the flu virus at bay with help from these foods:

- Chicken soup. Once again, your mother was right. Chicken soup provides fluids that help fight off viruses, and it can reduce inflammation and other symptoms of the flu.
- Garlic. Compounds in garlic (also onions) known as allion and allicin have an antiviral impact. For maximum effect, chew a raw clove every three to four hours. If necessary, try chopping the clove into smaller pieces to swallow like pills.
- Pumpkin seeds. The zinc in pumpkin seeds is said to help white blood cells fight off disease.
- Citrus fruits. The vitamin C found in most citrus fruits (as well as red bell peppers, brocco-li, sweet potatoes, and otherfoods) can reduce cold and flu symptoms by up to 25 percent.
- Blueberries. Antioxidants are more plentiful in blueberries than in lots of other fruits and vegetables. Eat half a cup a day during flu season. Fresh blueberries are best, but even frozen ones offer strong benefits.

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
