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From Our Park Manager:

This article was written for the residents of Lake Highlander so that they have a better understanding of how the maintenance is performed in the park.

This park operates within two seasons, winter and summer. In the winter, maintenance refrains in doing large interruptive projects because the park is full. We do not want to inconvenience residents that have come down for the winter for projects such as lanai, pool, clubhouse floor maintenance which entails those areas being shut down. Those areas are full with activities all winter and for me to shut them down would take away from the residents enjoyment. I know they have to be done but our practice is to wait until everyone begins to head north, and then we begin which is what we are doing now.

I begin to put together a project list around November and present the list to the Board in March. It is not a complete list, and it grows as the days go on. I meet with maintenance and we prioritize the projects based on need, condition and cost. I have to also be mindful of the daily maintenance that goes on yearlong to make sure it is completed. Maintenance is required daily, weekly, monthly and quarterly. A sample of some of the maintenance, washer/dryer repairs, recycling, pressure washing walkways, buildings, runoffs, trash pickup, floor cleaning. For example the Clubhouse floor gets a thorough cleaning at least twice a year, November and May as does the multipurpose building floors. The room must be emptied and it takes two days to give it a thorough cleaning. I schedule the cleaning months in advance so that it is on the calendar. The clubhouse floor is scheduled for May 24 & 25. The multipurpose building floors were finished last week.

Some of the projects that were scheduled for April and May are as follows:

Lanai repair -COMPLETED

Pool painting, caulking, pressure washing deck and wall, painting wall, globe base replacement, etc. -IN PROCESS

Recycle area - redesign - IN PROCESS

New footies on clubhouse chairs - IN PROCESS

Maintenance shed rehab - IN PROCESS

Last phase of the tree rings around the palm trees - IN PROCESS

We have projects on the list for every month this summer as we have in the past summers such as fence repair, not just the perimeter fence but the replacement of the laundry fence, recycling fence, and possibly at the end of the summer the maintenance fence, if budget allows. Please know that if a request/complaint is reported to the office, it will be considered but will go on the list based on need, condition and cost. If those parameters are not sufficient then it won't make the list at all.

Also, when you call to make a complaint that something is not working, i.e., the pool heater, we will try to fix it but if we can't we will call the vendor out. Please remember that the service people and vendors have other clients and are not at our beck and call so it will not happen as fast as you would like it to. Please be pleasant and patient.

This is not an all-inclusive list I am just trying to give you an idea of what it takes for one and a half maintenance men to care for 40 acres of land with common buildings. Please do not assume that we are not aware of what needs attention, we work very hard to make this park a place you would be proud to live in but it takes time and a lot of effort, it will not happen overnight. Do we miss things, yes, and that is where we rely on the residents to let us know. We are not here at night so we don't see the lighting that is out, we don't go in the pool so we don't see that the buoys are dirty, we do not work the air hose so we don't know if it is working or not, we are not playing cards at night to know if the AC is not working. If we can't see it we can't fix it. This is where the residents can help by letting us know these things. All you have to do is call, e-mail or visit the office to let us know.

Also, we do pay attention to resident requests. Please keep in mind that some projects or requests are beyond my budget and must be approved by the Board. But I do try to do what I can for residents that request something such as Patsy Perry requesting a railing at the steps to the gate at the pool. Because it was a small job and we had the necessary supplies, it was done.

I would like to say thank you to the residents that volunteer and also to the residents that let us know when things are not working. Steve Schultz let us know the problems with the umbrellas so we got new ones. Marty Read and Bud Howell have been loyally volunteering with the trash for a few years. Bruce DeWaters has stepped in and worked on projects when we just did not have the time. Jean St-Laurent who has volunteered with numerous major projects has saved the park big money. Bruce DeWaters and Jean St-Laurent have spent the past few months redesigning the maintenance shed to a level that is organized and clean that will definitely make the job more efficient for the maintenance men. Jean St-Laurent and Bob Bernier spent two years remediating the erosion on the island so that we still have an island.

You as residents can play an important part in the running of the park, you can volunteer. I have a budget to adhere to and when there is something that a resident can do, other than licensed work, it's a saving. You can contribute to making the community a great place to live by volunteering a few hours a month on any one of several association projects. Your ideas, time and effort will be a valuable contribution to making this park successful.

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

Hurricane Preparations

The Atlantic hurricane season runs from June 1 to November 30. This is a list of what you can do to prepare for a hurricane:

- Check your disaster supplies kit. Your disaster supplies kit should contain the following:
- 1. Flashlights and several sets of batteries for each member of the family.
- 2. Portable radio and batteries.
- 3. Drinking Water. A supply of one gallon per person, per day for a minimum of three days.
- 4. Non-perishable Food. A two-week supply is best.
- 5. Special dietary foods.
- 6. Non-electric can opener.
- 7. Prescription medications. Always keep a two-week supply on hand.
- 8. Infant supplies that include sterile water, diapers, ready formula, bottles, etc.
- 9. Mosquito repellent.
- 10. First aid kit including a first aid book, bandages, antiseptic, tape, compresses, aspirin and nonaspirin pain reliever, antidiarrhea medication and antacid.
- 11. Distress flag and/or whistle.
- 12. Toilet paper, paper towels and pre-moistened towelettes.
- 13. Camera and film.
- 14. Coolers. One to keep food and another to transport ice.
- 15. Plastic tarp, roofing paper, nails, tools, etc.
- 16. Plastic trash bags.
- 17. Clean-up supplies including a mop, buckets, towels, disinfectant, etc.
- 18. Water purification kit. Tablets, plain chlorine and iodine.

If you evacuate take the supplies above and also take:

- 1. Personal hygiene items such as toothbrush, toothpaste, deodorant, etc.
- 2. Extra clothing, shoes, eyeglasses, etc.
- 3. Pillows, blankets, sleeping bags, cots or air mattresses, folding chairs or lawn chairs.
- 4. Turn off electricity, water and gas.
- 5. Lock windows and doors.
- 6. Let relatives know where you are going.

Pay attention to news broadcasts. Keep a watchful eye on developing storms and their projected paths. Don't trust rumors.

Keep your car's gas tank FULL. Top the gas tank in your car off every couple of days. Lines get long, the gas supply becomes scarce and even non-existent the closer a storm gets to your area. Also, gas pumps do not operate without electricity and may not be available for days after a storm.

Water. You should have on hand at least one gallon of water per person, per day for at least three days, but preferably two weeks.

Non-perishable ready-to-eat foods that do not require refrigeration or cooking and little or no water. Examples: ready-to-eat canned meats and fruits; canned juices; milk; high energy foods including peanut butter, jelly, crackers, granola bars, trail mix; comfort foods including cookies, hard candy, instant coffee, tea, etc.

Prescription medication. You should have at least a two-week supply of your medications.

<u>Make a PLAN and a LIST</u>. Find out if your are in an evacuation zone. If you are, decide where you will go if you need to evacuate — a relative's house, a friend's house or perhaps a hotel. Make a list of articles you will need to take along if you have to evacuate (this includes your disaster supplies kit). If you plan on staying in your home, make a list of what supplies you will need for your disaster supplies kit.

Store valuables and documents in waterproof containers. This includes birth certificates and passports.

<u>GET CASH!</u> Banks and ATMs won't be in operation without power and few stores will be able to accept credit cards or personal checks. Think small bills, finding change for a \$20-bill may be difficult.
