<u>Manager's Report</u> reviewed 2016 park activities and accomplishments. The park was the beneficiary of major donations during 2016, including new office building, new office furnishings which were given anonymously.

- ✓ Hurricane shutters are now fitted on the Clubhouse and multi-purpose room windows. Cost \$24,000.00.
 - ✓ Park road settling repairs cost \$1,080.00
 - ✓ New flooring in Card Room cost \$2,372.00
 - ✓ Roof replacement, card room \$6,348.00



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- ✓ City of Dunedin now picks up large trash items; mattresses, furniture etc. Call office to make arrangements for disposal. This includes construction waste.
 - ✓ All volunteers who helped during the past 12 months were thanked.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

- ✓ President Killham thanked Director's Fred Wimmer and Sue Stevens for the excellent job of installing hurricane shutters on the club house and multi-purpose room.
 - ✓ Michel Bergeron was appointed to the Board following the resignation of Steve Schultz.
 - ✓ Veteran's Day Ceremony was very successful
- ✓ He announced that Bob Frazier was retiring from the Election Ballot counting committee after several years.
- ✓ The President thanked the staff as well as fellow Board members for a job well done in 2016. Of particular note, he thanked retiring treasurer Bob "Dusty" Rhodes for his 6 years of service on the board.

FINANCE CHAIRMAN REPORT

✓ Treasurer Dusty Rhodes (who did not run for re-election) gave a comprehensive overview of park finances. Using a power point presentation he pointed out how the budget tracked successfully during 2016. He has offered to be available to give financial advice to the Board if needed. Dusty, Susan Zerbe and Michel Bergeron have met with the park's financial advisor and were notified that our finances are in excellent condition. The next big task will be renewal of our mortgage which matures in 2018. Some or all of the pay-down account funds will be available to put against the mortgage at that time. All projections indicate a new mortgage will have a much lower monthly payment requirement. Treasurer Rhodes suggested that our Corporation continue with annual Full Audits. As this will be Dusty's last official meeting as Treasurer he reminded the membership that we have two experienced financial Board Members currently doing mortgage renewal research. Susan Zerbe and Michel Bergeron are actively speaking with a number of banks as we move toward our mortgage renewal date.

SALES AND MARKETING, report by Mary Lou Fraher

- ✓ 24 homes were sold during 2016
- ✓ In 2015, homes took an average of 29 weeks to sell. In 2016 homes sold on average within 10 weeks.
 - ✓ The park website averages 60 hits daily
 - ✓ There will be a Park Wide OPEN HOUSE event on Feb. 19, 2017.

LONG RANGE PLANNING REPORT by Bob Martin

- ✓ All buildings in park are now A.D.A. compliant.
- ✓ Bob Martin and Michel Bergeron will co-chair this committee for 2017

SAFETY AND SECURITY, report by Director Sue Stevens

- ✓ Security cart has been refurbished and is running well. The cart is manned with regular shifts, 7 days each week.

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HIGHGLIGHTS OF FEBRUARY BOARD MEETING

EDITORS NOTE, The number R.O. Board Directors has been reduced from 9 to 7

- ➤ First order of business was the election of new Board Executive members for 2017. The election results were as follows; President Gerry Killham, Vice President Doug Stewart, Secretary Rita St. Laurent and Treasurer Susan Zerbe. (President Killham appointed Director Michel Bergeron to serve as Assistant Treasurer.
 - ➤ Comments from the floor were solicited but no one spoke.
 - ➤ Correspondence, Kay Byrne asked the Board to consider replacing the clubhouse blinds.
- ➤ In reply to the Communications Committee request for a Board Member to give brief weekly Board updates at Saturday Coffee Hour, the request was denied. Board members will speak only when a situation requires prompt notice. Otherwise Coffee Hour will remain a social event.
- > PARK MANAGER'S REPORT; Manager Beth Carroll thanked all who sent cards and prayers during her recent medical leave. She is feeling fine and is back at work full time. #1, The office may re-schedule grass mowing due to dry and low grass height conditions #2, A plumbing Company will be doing a preventive maintenance inspection of water lines during the next few weeks. #3, New blinds for clubhouse are being priced out. #4, Two new replacement lakeside swings have been ordered. #5, As per a suggestion at the Members Meeting, a new railing will be installed at the pool entrance. #6, A reminder to groups using clubhouse kitchen facilities. DO NOT POUR GREASE DOWN THE SINK DRAINS. Use empty tin cans to collect grease and place in the trash. #7, As a result of park water conservation efforts, we have saved well over 1 million gallons of water during the past 5 years. Naturally our water bills have been significantly reduced as a result of the conservation. Several large credits have also been obtained following submission of past billings that were in error. #8, The Manager reminded everyone to renew reservations for use of park common spaces. (clubhouse, card room, multi-purpose room, Lanai etc.) The reservation and booking of common spaces is handled by Sharon Shedd in the office. Reservations are NOT automatically renewed each year. #9, Special group rates are available for Baseball games on April 6 & 13, at Brighthouse Field. Special pricing includes food and fireworks as well as entry for game. 18 to 20 people is the minimum number required for special pricing. Call office for details.
- ➤ TREASURERS REPORT, Susan Zerbe reported that Doug Stewart has joined herself and Michel Bergeron on the mortgage search team. Funds borrowed to fully fund our reserves last year has been repaid from the pay down account as planned. The pay down account now stands at \$829,474.00 and is projected to be \$1,000,000.00 at renewal time. Director Wimmer had a number of questions concerning park funds going back to 2009. It was suggested that he and the treasurer have a private meeting to review the old records and add some clarity. A question was asked; why did the maintenance fee increase when we have some much cash in savings? The answer was; the maintenance fee is determined by what we are required to have each year to run a balanced budget. It is what we need to operate annually without using savings.



- > COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE, Berry Adams reported that several individual park residents have developed a Lake Highlander FACEBOOK PAGE. Neither the Social Club nor R.O. Board of Directors was involved in this project.
- > SALES AND MARKETING, Mary Lou Fraher reported that we currently have 7 homes for sale. Each home will be featured on the park website and also be available for showing during the February 19 OPEN HOUSE event.
- ➤ DISASTER AND RECOVERY Fred Wimmer reported he will be reducing the number of volunteers currently on the committee from 9 down to 4. This is due to requirement imposed on volunteers who will be the first to reenter the park following an evacuation.
- ➤ LONG RANGE PLANNING, Michel Bergeron reported that his committee members are currently visiting area retirement parks to see what amenities they offer. A report of their findings will be available for study and review. Also revealed was the news that Park Manager Beth Carroll has decided that she will retire when her current contract ends in 2021, and has agreed to help a search committee find a qualified replacement. Beth has no plans to retire early.
- NEW BUSINESS, President Killham thanked retired Board members Sue Stevens, Dennis Lapointe and Dusty Rhodes for their service during the past several years. It was announced that a study is underway to investigate placement of security cameras at both park entrances.

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
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MEET THE NEIGHBORS

Editor's Note: From time to time I discover one of our Lake Highlander neighbors has a very unusual story to tell. Here is this month's interesting neighbor story;

Allan Stewart



Allan's hometown is Greenock Scotland, a small city 20 miles west of Glasgow. As a teenager his mother sent him to art school where he learned how to Letter signs. After serving a 5 year apprenticeship, lettering all sorts of business signs, Allan was hired by a company to paint complete signs, including murals and working with gold leaf trim. His work gained much recognition and he was frequently offered new jobs with higher pay. In 1951, he married Sarah and started raising a family. In 1959 he decided to immigrate to the United States. He immediately got work as a house painter, which really wasn't the field he was interested in. He eventually found work with

an architectural Decorating Company in New York City. He went back into decorative painting and before long the company recognized his talent for fine work.

Rambusch Decorating is an old established firm and had done decorating work in many famous buildings, including the <u>Roxy Theatre</u> in <u>New York City</u>, which seated 6,214 and the <u>Mark Hellinger Theatre</u>, which was built as a movie house but was later converted to a <u>Broadway theatre</u>. The firm helped decorate the main public rooms at the <u>Waldorf-Astoria</u> hotel when it was built.

Once the firm recognized Allan's special talents, he was sent out to work on many of the firms important clients. Allan was promoted to supervisor and worked as an architectural Decorator at a number churches and banks on Wall Street including J.P. Morgan, St. Patrick's Cathedral, and many other Church and Bank decorating projects around the country. He did the chapel at Boy's Town as well as chapel murals in Washington D.C. and Hershey, Pa. He even did a 30 x 16 mural of the history of the Bacardi Rum Company in Puerto Rico. One interesting event happened in Taunton, Mass. He was installing a form to be suspended from the ceiling of a large church. At one point he was well up into the dark rafters checking on the support system using a flashlight to find his way. At some point his light shone on a pair of shoes and as he worked the light up he discovered a man in a suit standing stock still as if at attention. Allan was so startled he nearly fell off the rafter but he did manage to exclaim "who are you?" to the fellow. The man answered "I'm up here visiting Jesus." Allan got some help and the intruder was taken away but the encounter had scared the daylights out of him. Soon after he retired and moved to #160 Joy Circle, Lake Highlander.

These days Allan strums the guitar on his front porch and is always ready to sing a song when he has an audience. Retirement suits him and he no longer gets called into high dark places to work. Recently he did a bit of mural work in Lake Highlander. Along with some artistic helpers, he assisted with the Palm tree and Light house murals at the shuffleboard courts. Go have a look and I'm sure you will agree, our neighbor Allan Stewart is still a n accomplished designer.



SWAN LADY BRING FACTS AND FIGURES TO SWAN DEBATE

Beth and the Swan Lady



The Regal Swan Foundation sent a Mute Swan specialist to give us the new Mute Swan requirements before putting 2 new swans on the lake. Sheila Bolen one of the worlds leading conservationists, spoke for 90 minutes and answered a host of "Swan" questions from a crowd of approximately 100 interested Lake Highlanders. Then she along with Park Manager Beth Carroll and Board member Susan Zerbe and many of the Swan Fact Finding Committee members toured the environs of the lake, searching for potential Swan Acclamation Sites in case the Board decides to purchase a

new pair of swans.

Chipper and Dipper lived for some 22 years which is about a normal swan life span. Ms. Bolen gave a fact filled talk, putting much emphasis on the need for a long term commitment to a new pair of swans. Due to their long life, she suggested a by-law be placed on the Park books recognizing the ongoing needs (both financial and direct care) for the exotic birds. She stated that new birds should be purchased at 6 months of age and would ideally be sibling sisters. This is generally the correct age to acclimate the birds to new surroundings. A special 12 x 24 foot area is also a requirement for housing new swans until they grow accustom to the lake waters and get to know their handlers and feeders. Ms. Bolen stated her association would be willing to come to the park and build the necessary new swan enclosure and identify a future handling area to be used when the birds had to be removed from the lake. Swans are almost impossible to train and should be handled by just a few people who receive training from the Swan Foundation. When storms are predicting winds of over 40-50 MPH the swans need to be placed in a secure place out of the wind. While in storm captivity they must be watered and fed regularly. The birds require annual inoculations and exams by licensed veterinarians. The person or persons who regularly handle the birds require Tetanus shots every 4 years. Ideal times for placing new swans on the lake are March/April when temperate weather conditions are present. Manager Beth Carroll reported the park has been spending around \$2,000.00 per year for total swan care and feeding. In closing, Ms. Bolen stated that our lake was an ideal swan habitat but new State Laws are in place as the mute swan is now labeled an exotic animal. A financial and care giver commitment of 20 to 30 years in writing (bylaws) is what is recommended by the Regal Swan Foundation before a new pair of lake swans are purchased.

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
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Lake Highlander Book Discussion

highly recommend the club create improved audit policies and procedures as they have no established format for the audit.



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
