TRAVELOGUE CROSSING MACHU PICCHU OFF OUR BUCKET LIST by Tracy and David Enscoe

n September we were blessed to travel to Peru with the tour company, Alexander & Roberts. Join us on our journey:

September 14th: We arrived one day early and explored the historic district of Lima, a UNESCO World Heritage Site, on our own. We watched the changing of the guard at the Presidential Palace and toured the Convent of St. Francis. There we descended into its catacombs where an estimated 75,000 bodies are buried.

September 15th: A walking tour of Miraflores, an upscale district in Lima, took us through John F. Kennedy Park and the Park of Love. El Beso (the kiss) is a large sculpture in the park that depicts the sculptor, Victor Delfín, and his wife kissing. The park is located cliff-side to the Pacific Ocean, where paragliders take off and land continuously.

Later that day we toured the Larco Herrera Museum. The extensive pre-Columbian collection of this world-famous museum included ancient gold and silver objects, as well as pottery dating back to 2000 BC and a tapestry from 1200 BC.

September 16th: We flew from Lima to Cuzco and journeyed down into the Sacred Valley to visit the Cochahuasi Animal Sanctuary, dedicated to the rescue and preservation of indigenous Andean wildlife. Next up was a visit to Awanacancha, a pioneering initiative with a mission to preserve the traditional arts of the region. We saw native weavers create beautiful textiles using techniques passed down for generations. There are about eight different varieties of llamas and alpacas, all providing different grades of fiber for their textiles.

September 17th: A local Andean shaman performed a traditional Tribute to the Earth for us. Their word, Pachamama, represents Mother Earth and is depicted visually by the condor, puma and serpent. We then visited the monumental fortress of Ollantaytambo, built by the Incas with enormous stones and strategically positioned to successfully defend against the Spanish in 1537. It's important to note that all Incan architecture and daily living was done without the use of the wheel, and boulders were honed to fit together perfectly without any mortar! Ollantaytambo's location in a narrow mountain valley framed by rugged peaks is truly breathtaking.



September 18th & 19th: Our two-day visit to Machu Picchu began with an unforgettable rail journey through the Urubamba River Valley, a region of snow-capped Andean peaks, quiet villages and terraced fields that have been cultivated for centuries. Machu Picchu is often referred to as the "Lost City of the Incas". Most archaeologists believe that Machu Picchu was constructed during the reign of Inca Emperor Pachacutec (1438–1472). It was declared a Peruvian Historic Sanctuary in 1981, a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 1983 and one of the New Seven Wonders of the World in 2007. Although known locally, it was not known to the Spanish during the colonial period and remained unknown to the outside world until American historian Hiram Bingham brought it to international attention in 1911. Machu Picchu officially opened for tourists in 1948. Little can be written here that would do justice to the breathtaking grandeur of its mountain setting, the enigmatic power and aura that permeate this ancient citadel and the unforgettable experience of standing among these ancient stones! Our guide said it's believed that when Manko Inka rose in arms in 1536, orders might have been given to abandon Machu Picchu and move on to the Amazon jungle.

September 20th: We visited Sacsayhuaman, also built in the 1400's by Pachacutec. The massive limestone blocks of this temple, built like a fortress, were cut with such precision that they fit together like the interlocking pieces of a jigsaw puzzle! With some individual stones towering more than 10 feet tall and weighing several hundred tons, Sacsayhuaman is a monumental achievement of architecture and masonry. It was partially disassembled by the Spanish in 1535 to build the Cusco Cathedral.

September 21st: Oropesa is celebrated across Peru for its generations-old bread-making traditions, and we visited a local bakery to taste some hot out of the oven – yummy! Locally know as pan chuta, the round loaves are made from traditionally-grown local wheat with a hint of sweetness and other spices including cinnamon and anise. Baked in traditional ovens, special woods and eucalyptus leaves are burned to impart more flavors and a delicate texture to the crust. Our final trek in Peru took us to the remote mountain village of Cuyuni with an elevation of 14,000 feet! Being our guide speaks Quechua, their native tongue, we were able to join

the villagers in their fields and homes to learn about their traditions and way of life that has changed little over the centuries. In the picture below, we bid farewell to the villagers and gave them some bread from Oropesa to thank them for their hospitality.

We came away from our Peru adventure with a new appreciation of how truly advanced the Incan civilization was!

- Don Hanson has been in contact with Duke Energy and they are working on our questions regarding the electrical lines.
- RFP's will go out to pavers in December. Beth anticipates paving will begin in March.
- The chicken wire is gone from around the pond with positive feedback. Please take care when fishing that you stay clear of the fountains. A couple of fishermen have gotten their lines snagged on the fountains.
- The chair committee has met and have begun their search of replacement chairs for the clubhouse. The committee consists of Carol Gardinier, Grace Hughes, Cathy Quast, and Liz Longhurst.

Karen Larrimore encouraged residents to update their profile sheet when it is mailed or emailed to you. It will come with the notice of the election of officers. Please make sure the office has the vehicle license number for any of your overnight guests.

Treasurer's Report

- At the end of September, we were approximately \$31,000 to the good, though there are bills to come in such as the payment of the generators of \$13,000.
- The transfer from Center State Bank to First Citrus Bank is going well. We will be keeping a minimum account open at Center State Bank until February. We still have a CD at Center State which will mature in February 2019.
- The draft 2019 budget was submitted to the board. The budget includes some increase in some budget lines due to inflation plus a 10% increase in the mowing contract. It is the first increase our mowers have asked for in 13 years. There is no proposed increase to the residents' month maintenance fee. Kathy proposed that the budget be approved and sent to the resident owners. The board approved the draft budget.

Sales and Marketing needs a new chair. There are other volunteer positions or jobs which need volunteers, including three positions on the board. Karen implored residents to consider stepping up to help.

Unfinished business:

- As of October 14, the new rules and regulations will be in force. They will be sent out to all resident owners and will be included in the 2019 phone directory.
- The large-capacity washer issue is still tabled. It was suggested that the Long-Range Planning Committee be asked to prepare a survey to go out the the resident owners regarding this and other issues.

New business:

• Kathy Hartwell was approached by a couple of residents to change our swimming pool from chlorine to a saltwater pool. Beth has done some research and found out it is not too expensive to change over. The pool company would have to monitor the pipes for corrosion. There would be no net savings, but it is not a big deal to change. It was suggested that this would be another good item to put on the survey.

The meeting was adjourned at 11 a.m.



THANKSGIVING DAY

Thanksgiving Day in the United States is observed on the 4th Thursday of November. In Canada, it is celebrated on the 2nd Monday in October. It began as a harvest festival and has been celebrated in the U.S. off and on since 1798. It has been celebrated as a national holiday since 1863.

The following information has been gleaned from an article by Andrew Lane in New American:

Many descendants of the Pilgrims follow a custom, begun on the first Thanksgiving Day in Plymouth, of placing five grains of corn beside each plate at the dinner table. Five grains of corn was the daily ration during those desperate days before the harvest when food was scarcely to be had. At each subsequent annual feast, the Pilgrims placed the grains at the table so that the reason for their rejoicing might not be forgotten. But the grains of corn would remind them of more than hardship and disaster. They would also recall that proudest fact of Pilgrim courage: that when spring came, and the Mayflower sailed home to England, every Pilgrim who survived the winter chose to remain in this new free land.

Each of the five grains of corn has special significance. The first grain reminds us that the earth is still good. This free land of our fathers yet pours forth its rich fruits and harvests into the hands of those who labor in it; it holds within its bosom vast reservoirs of power; it is a provident parent.

The second grain of corn should remind us of the Indians who befriended the Pilgrims and provided them with corn and squash that first dreadful winter and taught them to gather clams and to catch fish. Without their help and guidance, it is unlikely the new settlers would have survived. In listing our blessings, among those we would surrender last would be the love we share with our friends.

The third grain of our Thanksgiving corn reminds us of courage. Courage, we know, is a part of the armor of every great person. The winter had been severe, death a frequent visitor, and from England family voices called. But when the Mayflower returned to England, the colonists remained.

The fourth grain of corn reminds us that the Pilgrims came "to lay a foundation for the kingdom of Christ in these remote parts of the world." Freedom of conscience and religion was not simply a motto to them; they exercised their conscience to practice their religion. They prayed in their homes ... and their schools. They saw their freedom to do so as far more important than their physical comforts -- or even food and shelter.

That last grain of corn in the Pilgrim's Thanksgiving pentad represents the most compelling reason to be grateful. It is the fact that at the center of our universe, Creative Love still holds all life together.
