TALKIN' TRASH

This is a subject that is near and dear to all of us. We live in the City of Largo. We have to follow their rules as well as that of the Park. If you don't want to recycle, that's your business and so don't use the Blue Bins. **But** there are things that CANNOT go in either one. I know some will not even read this, because they don't read the Voice, but for those that do, please pass this info on. We will schedule the Waste Department to come and hold a short talk at coffee later this summer.

1. RECYCLING

Here is what **DOES NOT** go into the BLUE RECYCLING CONTAINERS:

<u>NO plastic bags or wrap</u>, NO needles or syringes, NO windows or mirrors, NO dishware, NO chemicals (oil, paint and paint cans, chemicals), NO Styrofoam, NO electronics, NO batteries, computers, TV's, etc, NO Pizza Boxes, NO Waxed Items

The above is posted on the outside of the blue recycling containers. <u>I didn't make this up!</u> <u>HERE</u> is what <u>DOES</u> go in the BLUE RECYCLING CONTAINERS:

¬-Plastic bottles

-Glass bottles/jars

-Aluminum/metal cans and containers

-Cartons, mixed paper - PLEASE BREAK DOWN BOXES TO LEAVE ROOM FOR OTHERS TO DISPOSE OF THEIR RECYCLING, no pizza boxes.

The above is posted on the outside of the blue recycling containers. I didn't make this up! IF YOU PUT YOUR RECYCLING IN A PLASTIC BAG, DUMP THE RECYCLING OUT OF THE BAG AND THROW THE PLASTIC BAG IN TRASH COMPACTOR

AGAIN, those items must be taken to 2855 109th Ave. North in St. Petersburg or other addresses

listed in the Largo web such as Marcotte's Architectual Salvage located at 426 West Bay.

What goes in it? Trash, trash, and more trash with the exceptions of the PARTIAL list below.

DO NOT Put the Following in the Trash Compactor

Paint and the cans unless empty, chemicals, oil containers, electronics like TVs. Computers, Large Batteries, Car parts, clothes, Gas cans. Use common sense, please!

Lastly, IF THE TRASH COMPACTOR IS RUNNING, DO NOT OPEN THE DOOR! OPENING THE DOOR JAMS THE TRASH COMPACTOR. Outside of the trash compactor there is a big white sign with red letters that says DO NOT open when running. I didn't make this up either!

3. WE DEPEND ON DEPENDS!

2. THE TRASH COMPACTOR

Please **<u>DO NOT</u>** dispose of Depends down the toilet. Largo was in here and had to do maintenance on the drainage system and found Depends in the system. Please DO NOT put Depends in the blue recycling containers. Depends must go in the trash compactor.

A Nurse's Toolbox #1

appreciate the opportunity to write articles on a variety of medical issues that can and do effect residents and my neighbors. This is a wonderful community. I want to do my part. I have been an RN for over 40 years, learned so very much, seen a lot and time to give back. I am not your doctor or his or her medical team. Nurses can and do every day translate complex medical problems in to practical language that can, hopefully, be understood and followed. I will do my best. You deserve nothing less.

The Atlantic hurricane season runs from June 1st through November 30th. For year-rounders like myself this is our storm season. Seasonal residents also have their own storm season whether tornadoes, strong rain and snow storms including remnants of our Florida hurricanes (we like to share.) Horrific weather can find us and sometimes if not often does. Though every resident from Newfoundland tells me each day is pristine with plenty of sunshine and little foul weather. The bottom line is be prepared wherever we live.

A compliment to Ann Curry on her previous article on disaster preparedness. I am going to zero in on being prepared when you have various chronic conditions. As a Navy nurse stationed

for 3 years on Guam, having a disaster plan that encompassed everything from pregnancies to chronic health conditions that could become a crisis during a typhoon (Pacific for a hurricane) was paramount to survival. The Navy hospital was responsible for Guam and all the surrounding islands like Saipan and Tinian. The islands had 3 major typhoons in my 3 years. Whew!

Without being specific to all chronic conditions let's say that you have to have certain medications, oxygen, nursing services, dialysis, just had major surgery, batteries for equipment vital to your survival that require replenishment within 10 days. Why 10 days? In a major weather event or disaster the supply of what you absolutely need to live isn't around the corner plus the supply lines to vendors, pharmacies, hospitals, clinics, home health can be threatened. We live in a supply world where large expensive reserves are no longer kept close to us. Dependence on UPS and FedEx is extensive. Ever need a part for something and it takes 2 weeks to get it? It is the same with medical supplies. Inventories are expensive to maintain. Remember Puerto Rico.

Let's start with when to actually start preparing. TODAY! Preparing isn't as hard as we think. I'll outline the essentials and then you take it one step at a time. Starting now means you don't have to rush when needed and forget something vital to your safety.

The first is life sustaining equipment. Mostly it is oxygen and the equipment required to deliver. Find an invoice from the vendor who brings the oxygen and maintains the devices. Put the invoice in an envelope that you will fill with other information. Take a picture with your phone too. If you have a second portable unit always ensure the other one is always full and ready to use. If you have large oxygen canisters they will be hard to transport. Oxygen concentrators can be heavy though newer versions are much lighter. You can't expect every shelter will have oxygen available though some shelters are open to those needing oxygen and have backup supplies. Shelters may or may not have consistent electricity to power equipment. If your equipment has rechargeable batteries then keep them charged. Pinellas County Disaster management can help you know where the best shelter for you! Staying at home may not be an option and can be deadly.

The second is pretty obvious and that is medications. If you don't have a current list of your medications then you can write your own or better to have you pharmacy always print up a list for you. In an emergency the list from the pharmacy carries a lot more weight in medical management. Believe me it does! Medication organizers are a true wonder to ensuring we take what we are supposed to take when we are supposed to. Always reminds me what day it is too! However the downside is that someone else has no idea what each pill is. Believe me. So, keep you re-supply of medications in their original container from the pharmacy. The lesson is to have at least one pill etc. in the container from the pharmacy. Do not ever wait until the last minute to have your medications including syringes refilled. You can reorder medications usually within 7-10 days of the due date. Mail order is the same. Remember, shelters don't have pharmacies and getting some vital medications in a disaster can be very difficult if not impossible. If you don't have one get a plastic container with a locking lid to keep all your medications in. Grab and go when it is needed. Always be prepared.



Some medications require refrigeration. Often they come in a Styrofoam container when delivered. Keep one, always! Don't toss the frozen ice bag either. Store it in your freezer. Assume the shelter doesn't have refrigeration or the ability to keep it cool. Oh, write your name on the cooler! I once had someone say that my insulin is in the white one. There were 20 white ones.

I will do a follow up article as other items forgotten will come to light. Hope this has been helpful. Oh, before I do forget. When bad weather is coming don't jump around to all the TV channels for news. Stick with your favorite. Anxiety can get out of hand when there is too much seemingly differing information. For hurricanes I find the NOAA website as most secure and helpful. Much more later.

DID YOU KNOW?

LHOA Meeting with Park Owner 5-10-2018

n May 10th, the LHOA's Negotiating Committee and our LHOA attorney, Jonathon Damonte, met with the Park Owner's attorney and Park Management to discuss those issues allowed by law (Rent, Tax Pass-Through and Park Maintenance). This meeting is considered the most constructive meeting in a long time (especially the last 4 years) as the Park Owner's legal representative and Park Management listened to the issues with interest which the LHOA brought to the table.

The primary issues discussed centered on missed opportunities by park management with respect to pre and post Hurricane Irma along with maintenance of the park. The benefits of timely and accurate communication before and after a major weather event to park residents concerning emergency park management contact information and the use of major amenities (pool, recreation center, laundry facilities, garbage pick and potential water-sewer interruption) is critical. Specific examples presented by LHOA were lack of power to properly filter and care for the pool, garbage piled quite high with no alternative disposal and potential for sewer back up when power was lost for many days. There was recognition that park management did display notices on the recreation center doors on where the official hurricane shelters were located along with Pinellas County disaster information

The committee also addressed a lack of Park Maintenance and Safety issues, which placed homeowners and residents at potential risk. These included sidewalks (79 annotated photos were presented), pool and spa equipment maintenance (making the pool and spa unusable for extended periods of time), mail box repairs (taking 7 weeks) and the dysfunctional (non-potable) irrigation water system.

Although the Park Owner's representatives did not present any specific actions to be undertaken, they were formally notified of these issues. In the end, it appeared the committee was taken seriously. After the meeting, the LHOAAttorney made a comment to that observation. We now get to wait and see what the future holds.

NOTE: Remember, when you file a complaint with Park Management, receive a letter or notice of any kind, give a copy to the LHOA. That way, the LHOA is aware of resident issues. If you have questions, ask the LHOA Board, as the Board maintains copies of documents and information to be able to assist owners in dealing with issues, as well as helping the Association work on your behalf.

Vaccine Protocol

This information is taken from an article by Dr..Buzby DVM. The idea of dogs going to the vet for their "annual shots" just because one year has gone by is as outdated as the idea that the earth is flat. There is overwhelming scientific evidence that dogs should be vaccinated based on their individual risk factors-age, breed, lifestyle, and environment.

Why does all this matter?

Vaccines jolt the system. This creates an immune response in the body that builds antibodies against an altered, non-pathogenic bug. These antibodies should then be protective if there is exposure to the live version of the germ. However, the jolt that helped create protection can be a problem. Autoimmune diseases, tumors, thyroid disease, and allergic or anaphylactic reactions (shock)are complications that can occur soon after vaccinations, or even much later.

Vaccines are brilliant inventions that have saved countless lives. I am not advocating throwing the baby out with the bathwater, but individualized vaccination strategies are the best way to go. They can be an integral part of maintaining health, but also hold the potential for harm.

Be informed. Be curious, with the ultimate goal of partnering with your vet in weighing the risks versus benefits of anything you give your dog. Discuss your dog's lifestyle and environment to design a customized vaccine protocol. It's important to mention if your dog travels outside the area.

Ask about vaccinating your adult dog no more than every 3 years for distemper and parvovirus instead of annually. Vaccinate your adult dog for rabies every 3 years, or the maximum interval allowed by law. The risk of a vaccine-related adverse effect increases with multiple simultaneous vaccines. If your dog is due for several vaccines, ask your vet if they can be staggered.

Some other examples of individual risk factors: I wouldn't vaccinate a 12 <u>year</u>-old dog like I would a 12 <u>month</u> old dog. Prior vaccine history determines what vaccines I'd recommend, and at what interval. I wouldn't vaccinate a 5 lb. Chihuahua for Leptospirosis, but I might recommend it for a 75 lb. Labrador. Because of their lifestyle, toy breeds often have little risk for exposure since this disease is transmitted through infected wildlife. Leptospirosis vaccine,

which is a standard component in many combo "annual" dog vaccines, can cause an immediate hypersensitivity reaction, which is more likely to occur in small dogs .Small dogs are statistically at greater risk of adverse events. But if my Chihuahua went on camping trips every weekend, I may elect to use the vaccine.

A dog who frequently visits the dog park or other doggie social scenes, like Lincolnshire, should probably be vaccinated for kennel cough, (Bordetella), while dogs who never leave their home turf don't typically need this vaccine. Another example is Lyme disease, which is big in the Northeastern US, but not so much down here.

VETERAN'S CHOICE PROGRAM

The VA will not run out of money for the Veterans Choice program before President Donald Trump signs a bill to extend and reform it, a VA spokesman said Thursday. "The Choice Program has sufficient funding to continue normal operations uninterrupted until the Mission Act is signed into law," the spokesman said. Officials at the Department of Veterans Affairs earlier had said that funding for Choice, which serves an average of 30,000 veterans daily with appointments for private and community health care, could expire as early as May 31. Last week, the Senate by a vote of 92-5 passed the VA Mission Act, which will provide \$5.2 billion to extend Choice for one year while overhauling how it operates. Under the Mission Act, seven separate programs under Choice would be consolidated into one system to improve efficiency. Trump pledged to sign the legislation quickly, but no date has been set for the expected White House ceremony that would mark one of the major achievements of his administration. The overall VA Mission Act, which Senate leaders said could cost \$55 billion over five years, would also expand the VA's caregiver stipend program for the families of disabled veterans. The caregiver program is now limited to post-9/11 veterans and would be extended to veterans of all eras. The VA Mission Act would eliminate restrictions under the current Choice program that mostly limit private and community care to veterans who live more than 40 miles from a VA facility or have to wait more than 30 days for an appointment. Currently, about one-third of the health care needs of veterans are served in the private sector, and concerns were raised during debate over the Mission Act Continued on page 37





that more outsourcing of care would diminish the VA's role as the primary provider. However, proponents of the bill from both sides of the aisle said that private care at government expense is an option only when it is in the best interests of the veteran.

FEDERAL DENTAL AND VISION PROGRAMS

1. Just another reminder to mark your calendars. As I told you last month that on December 31, 2018, the Defense Health Agency's TRICARE Retiree Dental Program (TRDP) will end. Don't worry! You can enroll in dental coverage for next year, effective January 1, 2019, but it will be under a different program, the Federal Employees Dental and Vision Insurance Program (FEDVIP), offered by the U.S. Office of Personnel Management (OPM). Vision coverage is also available to you for the first time under FEDVIP. Retirees and their families, who were eligible for TRDP, and family members of active duty service men and women, will now be eligible to enroll in a FEDVIP vision plan, if enrolled in a TRICARE health plan. You don't need to take action yet. However, if you would like dental and/or vision coverage next year, effective January 1, 2019, you must select and enroll in a FEDVIP plan during the next Federal Benefits Open Season. Open season is your annual opportunity to sign up for FEDVIP, and this year it runs from November 12 through December 10, 2018. Note: If you're currently enrolled in a TRDP plan, you will not be automatically enrolled in a FEDVIP plan for 2019. You must enroll during open season. FEDVIP is popular among Federal employees. The more than 3.3 million people already enrolled give the program high marks for quality and value. With 10 dental and four vision carriers to choose from, and some plans offering both high and standard options, FEDVIP offers great flexibility when selecting the right coverage for you and your family.


