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

### **The Winter Solstice**

### In 2016, winter begins on December 21, 5:44 a.m. EDT.

Winter solstice is the day with the fewest hours of sunlight during the whole year. In the Northern Hemisphere, it always occurs around December 21 or 22. (In the Southern Hemisphere, it is around June 20 or 21).

The word solstice comes from the Latin words for "sun" and "to stand still." In the Northern Hemisphere, as summer advances to winter, the points on the horizon where the Sun rises and sets advance southward each day; the high point in the Sun's daily path across the sky, which occurs at local noon, also moves southward each day.

At the winter solstice, the Sun's path has reached its southernmost position. the next day, the path will advance northward. However, a few days before and after the winter solstice, the change is so slight that the Sun's path seems to stay the same, or stand still. The Sun is directly overhead at "high noon" on Winter Solstice at the latitude called the Tropic of Capricorn.

# <u>Ouestion: Why is there such a time lag between the shortest day of the year (shortest amount of daylight hours) and the lowest average daily temperature of the year?</u>

**Answer:** This is the shortest day of the year, meaning the one in which we experience the least amount of daylight in 24 hours; it is also the time when the Sun reaches its southernmost point in the sky. Although this part of Earth is cooling, its great thermal mass still retains some heat from the summer and fall. As the gradual cooling process continues over the next two months, temperatures will continue to fall, and the coldest temperatures will be recorded. The same pattern holds true for the summer solstice in June, as the year's highest temperatures are recorded later, in July and August.

### **<u>Ouestion: Was Stonehenge built to celebrate the winter solstice?</u>**

**Answer**: That's one theory. Stonehenge was constructed in several phases over a period of many centuries. Due to the alignment of the stones, experts acknowledge that the design appears to correspond with the use of the solstices and possibly other solar and lunar astronomical events in some fashion. There are several theories as to why the structure was built, including that the area was used as a temple to worship the Sun; as a royal burial ground; and/or as a type of astronomical observatory. However, because none of these theories has been proven correct as yet, the true reason (or reasons) for Stonehenge remains a mystery.

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### **10 Things You Might Not Know About December Holidays**

- 1. The traditional Christmas plant we call a poinsettia was known by the Aztecs as cuetlaxochiti. Its current name came from the first U.S. envoy to Mexico, Joel R. Poinsett, who noticed the plant being used for holiday celebrations and sent a few north to the United States in the 1820s.
- 2. Hanukkah, based on the Jewish calendar, is a wandering holiday. This year, the eight-day celebration begins at sunset December 24 and ends on January 1, 2017.
- 3. Rudolph, who now resides at the North Pole, was born in Chicago in 1939. The Montgomery Ward department store chain assigned as copy writer, Robert May, to compose a Christmas poem that could be distributed to customers nationwide. He wrote "Rollo, the Red-Nosed Reindeer," but execs didn't like the name. They vetoed Reginald too. May's third name, Rudolph, was accepted, and the poem was shared with millions of customers.
- 4. Kwanzaa, which is observed December 26 through January 1, is a nonreligious holiday that celebrates African-American culture. The week long event highlights seven principles, including Nia, which is Swahili for "purpose." That's where actress, Nia Long, got her name.
- 5. Abraham Lincoln's youngest son, Thomas, nicknamed Tad, was known as a sensitive youngster. On Christmas 1864, Tad, then 10, took the spirit of the season to heart and invited some street urchins into the White House for a meal. The cooks refused to feed the kids until Tad took up the issue with the President, who ordered that the children be fed.
- 6. Among the holiday traditions on a decline are tinsel and spray cans of fake snow. Already declared dead are aluminum trees, which became uncool when they were denounced on TV's "A Charlie Brown Christmas."
- 7. Boxing Day is a weird holiday. No one is sure when it started or how it got its name. Celebrated in many British-influenced lands, Boxing Day is traditionally the day after Christmas. It may be an offshoot of St. Stephen's Day, which is what the Irish call it. In Canada and England, it has turned into a shopping frenzy like America's Black Friday. The "box" in Boxing Day may be the donation bins of the Anglican church that were opened for the poor on December 26. Or the name may come from the boxed presents that British aristocrats gave to the help the day after Christmas.
- 8. The Christmas tradition of kissing someone under the mistletoe took on a decidedly Chicago bent in 1975. Mayor Richard Daley was fiercely protective of his family. Responding to criticism that he funneled city business to a company that employed his son, he responded, "There's a mistletoe hanging from my coattail."
- 9. St. Francis of Assisi is credited with making the nativity scene part of the Christmas tradition. In 1223, he organized a live creche to emphasize Jesus's humble beginnings in poverty.
- 10. We were all told that the poem "The Night Before Christmas" was written by Clement Clarke Moore, a Manhattan scholar. But the facts are squishier. For starters, the poem was first published as "A Visit From St. Nicholas." For another thing, Moore may not have written it. Literary sleuth, Donald Foster, investigated the Christmas poem and concluded



that Moore was lying. Foster thinks the author was amateur poet Henry Livingston Jr. of Poughkeepsie, NY. Foster says the poem bears the style, outlook and cultural references of Livingston, not Moore. Moore didn't claim ownership until 1844, 19 years after the poem's anonymous appearance in a Troy, NY newspaper. By that time, Livingston was dead. Before coming forward as the author, Moore wrote to the Trowshether anyone remembered the poem's author. The answer cam might have known was dead and gone.

### **Fun Toy Facts**

"LEGO is the world's No. 1 tire manufacturer." They produce 306 million tiny tires a year. The word "toy" comes from an Old English word meaning "toof."

It wakes 63 feet of wire to make a Slinky.

Slinky was invented in 1945 by Marine Engineer, Neil Tollotson.

On Sesame Street, Bert's fish were named Lyle and Talbot, presumably after the actor Lyle Talbot.

The name "Crayola" means "Oil Chalk" in French from the combination of "craie" (chalk) and "oleagineuse (oily).

All G.I. Joe 12-inch action figures have a scar on their right cheek. They also have an inverted thumbnail on the inside of their left thumb in honor of a production error made years ago.

G.I. Joe was inspired by a TV show called "The Lieutenant" which was created by Gene Roddenberry, the creator of Star Trek. The star was Gary Lockwood, who would later guest star on Star Trek. Lockwood's character's middle name was "Tiberius" which was also James Kirk's middle name. Some guests stars on The Lieutenant also included future Star Trek cast members Leonard Nimoy (Spock), Nichelle Nichols (Uhura), and Majel Barrett (Computer voice and several other characters as well as Gene Roddenberry's wife.

The first video arcade game was Pong, introduced by Atari in 1972.

The yo-yo is believed to be the second-oldest toy in the world. The name yo-yo comes from a Filipino expression meaning "come come." The Yo-Yo originated as a weapon in the Philippine Islands during the sixteenth century. In 1985, Astronaut David Griggs used a Duncan Imperial Yo-Yo on live TV from the deck of the Space Shuttle.

Dolls are considered to be the oldest toys in history.

Tinkertoys were invented with Charles Pajeau was watching some kids play with pencils, sticks and empty spools of thread.

Hasboro introduced a toy in 1962 called "Flubber"(tied to the movie "Son of Flubber"). It



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was made from synthetic rubber and mineral oil. Unfortunately, it made people sick. More than 1600 people developed sore throats, rashes and other reactions from contact with the stuff and Hasboro had to recall it. To get rid of it, they buried it and put a parking lot over it. According to legend, on hot summer days Flubber would ooze through the cracks in the pavement.

# **9 Things You Might Not Know About a Christmas Carol**

- 1. Dickens was inspired to write A Christmas Carol in 1843 after he spoke at a charity night to raise money for the Manchester Athenaeum in England an institution dedicated to "Advancement and diffusion of knowledge." The 31-year-old spoke alongside the young Benjamin Disraeli, who would later become prime minister of Great Britain. After their talk, Dickens went on a long nocturnal walk later and had the idea for his "little Christmas book."
- 2. He started the story in October 1843 and wrote obsessively for six weeks. As Dickens wrote, he wept, laughed, and wandered around London at night "when all sober folks had gone to bed." He finished the novella at the end of November so it could be published in time for Christmas. A Christmas Carol hit the shops on December 17, 1843, and sold out in three days.
- 3. Dickens was the first famous writer to give public readings of his work and his first reading was A Christmas Carol. The reading took place in front of a crowd of 2000 people in the town hall of Birmingham, England, 10 years after the book was published. Dickens opened the reading by saying, "Ladies and gentlemen I have said that I bear an old love towards Birmingham and Birmingham men; let me amend a small omission, and add Birmingham women too. This ring I wear on my finger now is an old Birmingham gift, and if by rubbing it I could raise the spirit that was obedient to Aladdin's ring, I heartily assure you that my first instruction to that genius on the spot should be to place himself at Birmingham's disposal in the best of causes. I now have the pleasure of reading to you tonight A Christmas Carol in four staves."
- 4. Rather than simply read extracts from his stories, Dickens loved to perform them so he created a special version of A Christmas Carol for exactly that purpose. He tore the pages out of an original book, and stuck them into a new, large leafed, blank paged book. then he filleted the text, cutting out descriptive scenes to create a performance script. He added stage directions for himself all over the text. Such an annotated copy is called a prompt copy.
- 5. There is one extant copy of A Christmas Carol created by Dickens himself and it is owned by the Berg Collection of English and American literature at the New York Public Library (NYPL).
- 6. Dickens visited America twice for reading tours. During the second tour which took place at Christmastime in 1867 he used the prompt copy at the NYPL, once at a Steinway piano hall, and once at a church in Brooklyn. People camped out in the snow to be sure of a ticket. By opening time, the line was a mile long. The second tour earned him £19,000 about £1.4 million in today's money, and far more than he was earning from the royalties of his books.

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7. When he was 32, Mark Twain listened to one of the then-55-year-old Dickens' New York performances. He described the writer's entrance thus:

Promptly at 8 p.m., unannounced, and without waiting for any stamping or clapping of hands to call him out, a tall, "spry," (if I may say it), thin-legged old gentleman, gotten up regardless of expense, especially as to shirt-front and diamonds, with a bright red flower in his button-hole, gray beard and moustache, bald head, and with side hair brushed fiercely and tempestuously forward, as if its owner were sweeping down before a gale of wind, the very Dickens came! He did not emerge upon the stage - that is rather too deliberate a word - he strode.

Twain's review was not favorable. "There is no heart," he said. "No feeling - it is nothing but glittering frostwork." Bah Humbug!

- 8. On reading days, Dickens would drink two tablespoons of rum mixed with cream for breakfast, a pint of champagne for tea and, half an hour before he went on stage, he would knock back a sherry with a raw egg beaten into it. During the interval of his reading he would sip beef tea, and at bedtime he'd have a bowl of soup.
- 9. Just as Dickens' first public reading was of A Christmas Carol, so was his last. The author had decided to retire from readings because his health was failing, and his final performance took place at St. James' Hall in Piccadilly on March 15, 1870. His son recorded his last words to the audience. "... from these garish lights I vanish now for evermore, with one heartfelt, grateful, respectful, and affectionate farewell."

criminal with a long record of transgressions was on trial for his latest crime. The jury found him guilty on 33 counts, and the judge sentenced him to 189 years in prison. Realizing that even with time off for good behavior he would be more than 100 years old when he was finally released, the prisoner burst into tears.

Touched by this display of remorse, the judge paused to reconsider. "I didn't mean to be so severe," she said. "Thinking it over, I can see that I've imposed an extremely harsh sentence. So you don't have to serve the whole time."

The prisoner beamed with new hope until the judge leaned toward him. "Just do as much as you can."

Hearing this, the mouse realized he was better off having tiny teeth and went off to find his nut again.




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### Did you know that December is also...

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# You can't miss these December holidays

he celebrations and holidays of December come from many different countries and cultures. Here's a guide to what your friends and neighbors are up to this month:

• Hanukkah, Dec. 24-Jan.1. Hanukkah marks the rededication of the Temple of Jerusalem following the Jews' victory in the Maccabean Revolt in 165 B.C. According to the Talmud, the Jews had only enough olive oil to keep the eternal flame in the Temple burning for a single day—but miraculously, the oil continued to burn for eight days, during which time the Jews were able to produce and consecrate fresh oil for the flame. The eight-day Jewish holiday begins at sundown. Hanukkah is observed by the lighting of a nine branched candelabrum called a menorsh. One cand



the lighting of a nine-branched candelabrum, called a menorah. One candle is lit each of the eight nights, with a central candle lit each night to light the others.

- Christmas, Dec. 25. This Christian holiday celebrates the birth of Jesus, sometime between the years 7 and 2 B.C. The word "Christmas" comes from "Christ's Mass," a phrase first recorded in old English in 1038. Christmas began to be observed with feasts and celebrations in the Middle Ages—the online encyclopedia Wikipedia notes that King Richard II of England hosted a Christmas feast in 1377, with 28 oxen and 300 sheep eaten. The colonial Puritans of New England disapproved of Christmas celebrations, banning them during the 17th century. But other colonists observed the day with Christmas trees and nativity scenes. President Ulysses S. Grant signed the law making Christmas a federal holiday in 1870.
- Kwanzaa, Dec. 26 to Jan. 1. A seven-day celebration of African heritage and culture,
- Kwanzaa was created in 1966 by activist Maulana Karenga to provide African-Americans with a holiday that emphasized their shared history and experience. The name Kwanzaa derives from "matunda yakwanza," a Swahili phrase meaning "first fruits." Houses are decorated with African art and colorful cloth, and seven candles are placed in the kinara, a candleholder. The central candle in the kinara is black, with three red candles on the left and four green candles on the right. The candles represent the Seven Principles of Kwanzaa, which are contemplated each day as one is lit: unity, self-determination, collective work and responsibility, cooperative economics, purpose, creativity, and faith.
