Soft Chocolate Chip Cookies

- 4-3/4 cups flour
- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 2 cups butter, softened
- 1/2 cup white sugar

- 1 (3.4 ounce) packages instant vanilla pudding mix
- 4 eggs
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 1-1/2 cups packed brown sugar 4 cups milk chocolate chips (or semi-sweet)

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Sift together the flour and baking soda, set aside. In a large bowl, cream together the butter, brown sugar, and white sugar. Beat in the instant pudding mix until blended. Stir in the eggs and vanilla. Blend in the flour mixture.

Stir in the milk chocolate chips, trying to spread evenly through the cookie dough. Make balls of cookie dough, about 1 inch in diameter.

Bake for 10 to 12 minutes in the preheated oven. Edges should be golden brown.




Note: If you ever feel compelled to 'mug' yourself with a Tazer, one note of caution:

1 Oreo Lasagna

Ingredients:

- 1 package oreo cookies
- 4 tbsp. butter, melted
- 8 oz. reduced fat cream cheese, softened
- 1/4 cup sugar

- 2 tbsp. skim milk
- 12 oz. fat free Cool Whip
- 6 Snack Pack Fat Free Chocolate Pudding cups (or make 1 package of chocolate pudding)

Instructions:

- 1. Spray a 9x13 casserole dish with non-stick spray
- 2. In a food processor, or in a zip closed bag, crush the Oreo Cookies (I used the bag version and it was super easy without all the clean up of the food processor)
- 3. Set aside 1 cup crushed Oreo's for topping
- 4. Combine remaining crushed Oreo's with melted butter
- 5. Press buttered Oreo's into the bottom of the prepared dish
- 6. In a small bowl whip the softened cream cheese using a handheld mixer until light and fluffy.
- 7. Mix in sugar, milk and 1-1/4 cups of Cool Whip until well combined
- 8. Spread cream cheese layer over the Oreo crust until smooth and even
- 9. Layer chocolate pudding in an even layer over the cream cheese
- 10. Spoon remaining Cool Whip over pudding and gently smooth
- 11. Sprinkle on mini chocolate chips
- 12. Place in refrigerator to chill for at least 4 hours but overnight is best

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

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The Old Coot Checks Out Checking Out

o there you are, in line at a grocery store, patiently waiting as your items get scanned into the cash register, Boing! Boing! Boing! one after the other; the UPC code is recognized and accepted by the mechanism that cashes you out. Every once in a while, an item won't Boing. The clerk wipes off the bar code and tries again. That usually does it. If not, she quickly enters a long string of numbers from the package and goes to the next one. It takes just over a minute to check out 50 items. Still, we impatiently rock back and forth from one foot to the other, anxious to get our bags and get out the door.

How different this scene was a few decades back; each item had a price tag stuck to it, not a bar code. The cashier had to turn the item this way and that to find it, enter it into the cash register, while under the pressure of an eagle-eyed shopper checking her every move. Often saying, "Hey, You overcharged me on that can of corn; it was 36 cents; you rang up 63 cents." The adjustment was made on the next item; the math was done in the clerk's head and explained to the eagle-eyed shopper, "The ham is \$3.96; I took off 27 cents to fix the overcharge for the corn." Checking out 50 items took five minutes or more back then. And, get this; the clerk had to figure out how much change to give the customer, all by herself. The cash register didn't do it; she did it in her head. It was like this every place; not just grocery stores. School kids today would be hard pressed to figure out how much change to give someone who paid for a \$16.25 purchase with a \$50-dollar bill. They can write a sentence about the mathematical manipulation and show four ways to arrive at an answer, but I doubt they could multiply, add, and subtract in their heads like cashiers did before "smart" cash registers came along.

Going further back in time, the checkout process was even more tedious. The grocer would write the price of each items on a brown paper bag with a #2 pencil. He's sum the column and come up with a total. Change was made in a drawer under the counter with slots for tens, fives and ones, and pennies, nickels, dimes, quarters and half-dollars. Most neighborhood grocery stores couldn't afford a cash register. Payment was made in cash. No checks or credit cards back then, though many mom and pop operations ran a tab.

Next time you are in line behind five people with a cart full of groceries, multiply 5 minutes times each person and find out how long you'd be there in the good old days. (You can do that in your head can't you?) If my old coot buddies did this, it might stop them from grousing about the high tech society we life. Sometimes a trip down memory lane makes you appreciate the present.



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Eat Better to Spur Creativity

ome great artists and writers are known to have used drugs or alcohol to seek inspiration, but you don't have to risk your health when you need a creative boost. The Medical Daily website suggests trying some of these foods to help stimulate the brain:

• Fruit. Fruits have lots of an amino acid called tyrosine, which helps synthesize proteins and may influence your ability to think deeply. In one study, students performed better at completing puzzles when they drank orange juice strong with tyrosine.



- •Chocolate. The flavanols in chocolate may enhance short-term cognitive skills, according to one British study, because flavanols boost the amount of oxygen in the brain. Try a cup of hot cocoa before you need to be at the top of your mental game.
- Carbohydrates. Carbs deliver a quick dose of glucose to your body and brain, providing aid to concentration and memory. Potatoes, oatmeal, and other carbs may have a beneficial effect on brain function
- Walnuts. Rich in omega-3 fatty acids, walnuts can help memory and increase brain function, according to the journal Plant Foods for Human Nutrition. The results of one study showed that rats given a diet of raw walnuts for 28 days showed better learning and memory than rodents on another diet.



Money Matters

Try these smart shopping tips at the grocery store

Everyone wants to stretch his or her food dollars. You don't have to live on ramen noodles and cold cereal three times a day to do it. Here are some tips for savvier shopping at the store:

- Don't fall for fancy displays. Items stacked at the end of the aisles, like sodas, aren't necessarily on sale. The display can make them seem like they're marked down, but often they're still regular price.
- Remember that you pay for convenience. Skinless chicken breasts cost more than those packaged with skin. The same applies to the pre-cleaned and cut carrot sticks. In both cases, they're a little more expensive. Decide whether the convenience is worth the extra money.
- Try the store brands. If you compare the contents and nutritional value of name-brand versus no-brand items, you'll often discover that they're almost identical. In many cases, they're made in the same plant and just packaged with the store label.
- Use coupons. How often have you clipped coupons only to allow them to expire? Develop a system that will ensure you remember and use them.

Basic Facts

- June is named for the Roman goddess Juno. The month of June is a popular month for weddings, perhaps because Juno was the goddess of marriage.
- In ancient Rome, June was the fourth month of the year. When the Gregorian calendar was adopted, it became the sixth month of the year. It is one of the four months with thirty days.

Birthstones

- The traditional birthstone for June is the pearl. It is a symbol of purity and is the only gem that comes from living sea creatures.
- Alexandrite is an alternate birthstone for June. This unique gemstone changes color depending on the lighting conditions. It is greenish brown in color when exposed to daylight and fluorescent light, but changes to a purple, reddish hue by incandescent or candlelight. It is a symbol of joy and good fortune.
- Another alternate birthstone for June is moonstone. It is considered a sacred stone in India. Moonstone varies in color from clear to bluish white or peach. It is a symbol of health and longevity.

Flower



- The flower for the month of June is the rose. Roses are a symbol of love and appreciation. They are also known as the flower of passion.
- Roses come in a wide variety of colors. Each color has a different meaning. Red roses symbolize love; white roses symbolize innocence and purity, and light pink roses are a symbol of admiration or sympathy.

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Here's to you, dad: The start of Father's Day

ather's Day started with a dedicated woman: Sonora Smart Dodd, the daughter of a widowed Civil War veteran who had raised her on his own. Dodd came up with the idea for a special day celebrating fathers when listening to a Mother's Day sermon in 1909. She held her own special tribute for her father on June 19, 1910, in Spokane, Wash., and began a campaign for an official celebration thereafter.

The idea of Father's Day initially met with some skepticism, but in 1919, President Calvin Coolidge expressed support for the holiday, and in 1926 a National Father's Day Committee was formed in New York City. In 1966 President Lyndon B. Johnson signed a proclamation designating the third Sunday in June as Father's Day, but it wasn't until 1972 that President Richard Nixon officially recognized it as a national holiday.
