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






id you know that turkey wasn't even served at the first Thanksgiving - and that the Pilgrims didn't use forks because they weren't invented yet? Impress your kids (and the in-laws!) with these crazy, yet true, fun facts about Thanksgiving!

On the fourth Thursday in November, families across the U.S. gather to feast on turkey, watch football and gear up for Christmas by looking for Santa during the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade, but did you ever wonder why these Thanksgiving traditions started?

Impress your family with these Thanksgiving Day facts:



Thanksgiving didn't become a national holiday until over 200 years later! Sarah Josepha Hale, the woman who actually wrote the classic song "Mary Had a Little Lamb," convinced President Lincoln in 1863 to make Thanksgiving a national holiday, after writing letters for 17 years campaigning for this to happen.

No turkey on the menu at the first Thanksgiving: Historians say that no turkey was served at the first Thanksgiving! What was on the menu? Deer or venison ducks, geese, oysters, lobster, eel and fish. They probably ate pumpkins, but no pumpkin pies. They also didn't eat mashed potatoes or cranberry relish, but they probably ate cranberries. And no, Turduckens (a turkey stuffed with a duck stuffed with a chicken) were nowhere to be found during that first Thanksgiving.

No forks at the first Thanksgiving! The first Thanksgiving was eaten with spoons and knives - but no forks! That's right, forks weren't even introduced to the Pilgrims until 10 years later and weren't a popular utensil until the 18th century.

Thanksgiving is the reason for TV dinners! In 1953, Swanson had so much extra turkey (260 tons) that a salesman told them they should package it onto aluminum trays with other sides like sweet potatoes - and the first TV dinner was born!

Thanksgiving was almost a fast - not a feast! The early settlers gave thanks by praying and abstaining from food, which is what they planned on doing to celebrate their first harvest, that is until the Wampanoag Indians joined them and (lucky for us!) turned their fast into a three-day feast.

Presidential pardon of a turkey: Each year, the president of the U.S. pardons a turkey and spares it from being eaten for Thanksgiving dinner. The first turkey pardon ceremony started with President Truman in 1947, President Obama pardoned a 45-pound turkey named Courage, who was flown to Disneyland and served as Grand Marshal of the park's Thanksgiving Day parade!

Why is Thanksgiving the fourth Thursday in November? President Abe Lincoln said Thanksgiving would be the fourth Thursday in November, but in 1939 President Roosevelt moved it up a week hoping it would help the shopping season during the Depression era. It never caught on and it was changed back two years later.

Wild turkeys can run 20 miles per hour when they are scared, but domesticated turkeys that are bred and heavier and can't run quite as fast.

# **Model T: The Everyman's Automobile**

n September 26, 1908, the first Ford Model T left the factory.

Here are some things you may not have known about the iconic car.

Contrary to popular belief, the Model T wasn't the first car built on a modern assembly line. That honor goes to the Oldsmobile Curved Dash in 1901. Henry Ford didn't begin using his conveyer-belt style assembly line on the Model T until 1913.

The price for a Motel T Runabout in the first year of production was \$825, which is worth roughly \$22,000 today. By 1925, the price dropped to \$260, which would be about \$3,500 today.

Henry Fold was famous for saying, "Any customer can have a car painted any color he wants so long as it's black," however this wasn't always the case. The Model T was originally available in gray, blue, green and red. By 1912 it was available only in midnight blue. Between 1914 and 1927, black was the only option.

Eventually more that 15 million Model T's were produced, which was the most of any model until it was surpassed by the Volkswagen Beetle in 1972.

The last Model T produced in the U.S. rolled off the line on May 26, 1927, although some factories around the world continued making them. Ford continued building Model T engines until 1941.

Ford retooled the assembly lines to begin building new Model A's.

- 1-2/3 cups all purpose flour
- 3/4 cup packed brown sugar
- 1-1/2 teaspoons baking powder
- 2 teaspoons pumpkin pie spice
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup milk
- 2/3 cup canned pumpkin
- 1/4 cup melted butter
- 25 whole pecans



- 1-1/2 cups very hot water (boiling)
- 3/4 cup packed brown sugar



- 1. In a large bowl, sift together flour, sugar, baking powder, pumpkin pie spice and salt. Whisk until blended.
- 2. Add milk, pumpkin and melted butter. Mix until smooth.
- 3. Spread batter into the bottom of the slow cooker (4 or 5 qt. works best)
- 4. Top with pecans, pressing firmly into the batter.
- 5. Add brown sugar and water into a small sauce pan. Heat over medium heat until simmering and sugar dissolves. Carefully pour into slow cooker, over batter.
- 6. Place 2 paper towels or a large cheese cloth over the top of the cooker (prevents steam from dripping on cake). Carefully place lid on top and cook on high for 1 2-14 hours, depending on how hot your cooker runs, or until a toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Check after 1 hour and then ever 30 minutes.
- 7. Serve warm, spooning sauce from the bottom of the pan over the cake.

\* To bake cake in an oven, spread the batter into an 8 or 9" square pan. Pour the brown sugar & hot water mixture over. Bake @ 350 for 35-45 minutes.

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

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
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# Murgatroyd

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# Busy as a bee—even when the bees are sick

Toneybees are hard workers—even when they're sick. The (e)Science News website reports that researchers using radar technology have learned that honeybees continue to seek and collect honey for their hives even when they're suffering from infections or viruses.

The scientists mounted tiny, lightweight transponders to bees' thoraxes, enabling them to track individual bees using a radar signal. Studying the flight paths of 78 bees, the researchers found that although the sick bees didn't fly as far or as long as their healthy counterparts, they continued their search, suggesting that bees are hardwired to seek and procure honey even when they're ill.

# **Copper bracelet suggests vast ancient trade network**

n ancient copper band unearthed with cremated human remains in Georgia suggests that Native Americans may have traded across greater distances than previously was thought, according to the EurekAlert website. The band, a little wider than a bracelet, came from the Great Lakes region some 1,500 miles away. Scientists were able to determine the band's origin because copper sources have a unique chemical makeup.

The fact that the Native Americans were cremated is also significant, because cremation was unknown in the Southeast United States during the time period the bracelet dates from—some 3,500 years ago—but was commonly practiced in the Great Lakes region and other northern regions. This suggests that our ancient ancestors may have had connections across large distances, allowing for wide trading networks across North America.

The question is one of judgment. For the distinguishing element of science is not intelligence but judgment. Or perhaps it is simply luck.

# Take a cold shower—for better health

howers keep you clean, but a cold shower can be good for your health. An article on the Success website spells out the benefits of taking cold showers:

- Immunity. Scientists believe there's a correlation between cold showers and increased production of an amino acid called glutathione, which boosts the immune system, gets rid of toxins, and eases stress.
- Better skin health. A hot shower removes important oils from the skin, making it dry and itchy. Cold showers reduce skin inflammation. They also prevent your hair from becoming brittle.
- Muscle recovery. There's a reason why athletes soak in ice baths after a tough game. The cold water helps speed their recovery time and relieve soreness quicker.
- Better moods. Cold showers may prevent depression, according to researchers at Virginia Commonwealth University. Decreasing the temperature of your water and then spending two or three minutes under cold water sends a lot of electrical impulses from the nerves in your skin up to your brain, which could have an anti-depressive effect.

# Climate change strategy a mixed bag

Scientists scrambling for a solution to the problems caused by climate change have come up with an intriguing idea: shooting tiny particles high into the atmosphere to scatter the light of the sun.

The Science magazine website reports that sulfur dioxide gas can cool down temperatures by reacting to water vapor and forming droplets that scatter sunlight. It happens during major volcanic eruptions, such as the eruption of Mount Pinatubo in the Philippines in 1991 and the eruption of El Chichon in Mexico in 1982.

Scientists have used computer modeling to project the effect of injecting light-scattering aerosols into the stratosphere.

Unfortunately, the probable results appear mixed. Although the model predicted that corn harvests would increase 6.3 percent due to reduced heat, other crop yields would fall because of diminished sunlight, and the strategy would likely have no effect on yields for crops like soybeans, rice, and wheat. Scientists continue to study the theory in hopes of finding a viable approach to managing climate change.

# Is it a headache—or a brain tumor?

Is that headache a sign of a serious medical problem? Maybe, but don't panic. A severe headache makes many people worry that they have a brain tumor, but according to The Cut website, the time to worry about brain tumors is when you have a headache combined with vomiting. These types of headaches come on suddenly, often at night, and feel worse when you're lying down. Over time they'll create other symptoms—numbness, weakness on one side of the body, and speech and vision difficulties.

More likely, a severe headache is either a migraine or a cluster headache. Both of these tend to appear in one side of the head. Some 36–44 million Americans suffer from migraines, which can last up to 72 hours. Cluster headaches also occur on one side of the head, and come in waves—people may have up to eight per day. They're more painful than migraines, but they're also over more quickly, lasting from 20–45 minutes.

Seek treatment, but don't worry yourself sick about brain tumors.



# **Doctors shortchanging patients, study says**

octors are busy people—sometimes too busy. A study conducted by the University of Florida found that patients, on average, have only about 11 seconds to tell their doctors what's wrong with them before the doctor interrupts, sometimes sidetracking the interview. That may have something to do with the study's other finding—that doctors identified the patient's reason for the visit correctly only about 36 percent of the time.

The researchers offered several explanations for the situation: physician burnout, time constraints caused by the necessity of dealing with health insurance issues, and limited training in patient communication skills for physicians trained before 2004 (after that, training put more emphasis on communicating with patients).

# Surprising sources of pain

The causes of pain aren't always obvious. Consider these unexpected sources:

- Back pain. Taking your vitamins? Chronic back pain can be caused by low levels of vitamin D. Another possibility: constipation caused by blockage in the colon. Eat more fruits, vegetables, and fiber for better digestion. (Source: Prevention magazine)
- Headache. Cheese may be the culprit. A substance called tyramine in cheese can trigger headaches. Also, low blood sugar can create a headache even before you realize you're hungry. A snack like whole-grain crackers with peanut butter can bring quick relief. (Source: the WebMD website)





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
