An interesting Month.

Its Flower is Violet, its Birthstone is Amethyst, its Zodiac sign is Aquarius up to the 19th and beginning the 20th it is Pisces. It is the shortest month of the Calendar having 28 days normally and 29 days on Leap Years.

Having only 28 days in common years, it is the only month of the year that can pass without a single full moon. The next time this will happen will be in 2018. February is also the only month of the calendar that, once every six years and twice every 11 years consecutively, either back into the past or forward into the future, will have four full 7-day weeks. The next occurrence will be in 2021 for those Countries that start their Calendar Weeks on Monday. In countries that start their week on a Sunday (the US), it occurs in a common year starting on Thursday, with the next occurrence in 2026. The last time it occurred was in 2015.

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marks are being left on driveway. Vehicles parked on sidewalk impede cutting.

Rodent Issue: Management to check on the abandoned houses if they do receive a written complaint. They can place bait on the outside of the unit. Management cannot enter a unit they do not have a legal title to. Karen did call the Health Dept. but they cannot do anything because it is private property. Management does check on the units they have legal title to. Register a written complaint with the address if any rodents are noticed and they will address it. Park Management will now start noting the units that need painting, cleaning, weed control and clutter in the car ports. They feel this has been a timing issue, giving the snow birds a chance to clean up since returning. They not a lot has been done already. The park emphasized that they need all complaits in writing and signed. They reassured me that complaint forms are confidential except if they have to go to court over the issue and the defendant asks to see the complaint form. On the reverse, if you have a complaint form registered with the office and you want the HOA to assist you, then you hae to give us a copy of the form. Confidentiality would be lost.

New Business: Sink hole: Not a sink hole. Dug down and looks like a pipe line issue that needs repair. Will rectify when determined what happened. It is important to report issues when sighted or suspected. Lights are out in entrance sign. Storage lot: being addressed in Jan 2017. Andy volunteered to assist Susan and is appreciated. How many vehicles per coach? Picnic table in lot is falling apart. Needs to be repaired or taken away. Reminder to pick up dog do do. Small children in park (for longer than allowed) speeders and a Pit Bull were brought up. The owner where small children are was given a notice they must leave. These issues must be documented and reported. Moles, etc are to be dealt with by coach owner. Verbal explanation should be given to new residents. We could use an extra bulletin board for the overflot of notices. A No Parking sign in front of the pool would stop shuffleboard players from other parks walking through the pool area. FMO was discussed. Membership fees go into a treasury to help with legal fees. We have lobbyists in Tallahassee. It would be good to have a rep from the park to attend meetings.

A wish list was suggested by our acting President Alan Hennigar: Bathrooms should be handicap accessible. Management to make rounds of park regularly with HOA member to assess any clean up, weeding, painting etc. Vinyl fence for shuffleboard for next year. Suggested recreational equipment in clubhouse, pool table, shuffleboard, etc.

Adjournment: motion made to adjourn and seconded. Meeting adjourned at 11 a.m

POOL AND PET OWNER REMINDERS

FYI: Riviera Estates MHP would like to remind our residents that **NO one is allowed to touch the temperature settings on the pool heater and/or the clubhouse air conditioner.** Our manager and the Homeowner's Association Executive Board have insisted on this. Pool hours are 9:00 a.m. until dusk daily. Pool is heated in winter, the months of November through March. Please remember when leaving the pool, to **CLOSE DOWN THE UMBRELLAS**, pick up your trash and close the gates. If you are going by the pool, and see the umbrellas are open, please go in and close them. A wind gust can pick them right up and they become a missile and could damage or injure, along with the umbrella itself getting damaged. Treat our community pool as if it were your own. Thank you.

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ATTENTION PET OWNERS: Please be a responsible pet owner and a **RESPECTIBLE** pet owner as well. When walking your pets, please do not allow them to "potty" in other people's yards. Some are not pet lovers as we are. Your dogs must be leashed at all times, and there are plenty of areas where your dog can go. There is a pet cleanup station in the storage field for your use. Please be sure to clean up after your pet. Also, please try to keep your pet from barking or making loud disturbing noise that can bother a neighbor. Complaints are being received by the office on a constant basis of pet problems in the park. So, at this time,

our pet rule policy should be noted. Pets are allowed in park, *UP TO 20 POUNDS* weight restriction. Copies of pet innoculation certificate must be givien to the office as proof the pet has been vaccinated. There is a *LIMIT OF TWO PETS PER COACH*. Fences for the pets are not allowed to be installed. All pets must be leased at all times when outside the coach. Make certain when you leave your pet, they are not barking the entire time you are gone and bothering your neighbors. If this is the case, please make some type of arrangements that will alter this situation, such as a pet sitter, taking pet with you, or if the problem continues, and complaints continue in the office from

residents being bothered by the barking, the park is forced to take steps in resolving the issue, such as requiring you to get rid of the dog, or face eviction procedures. Please be a responsible pet owner and obey the rules concerning them. It is *IMPERATIVE THAT YOU CLEAN UP AFTER YOUR PET EVERYWHERE, INCLUDING THE DOG WALKING AREA*. Please do not ignore these pet owner rules, so that we all can continue to love and enjoy ourpets. But at all times we must be respectful of all the residents that live here, that they are not bothered by our pets in any way. Not by hearing them all the time, or stepping in their waste when out walking etc. Thank you for adherence to the policies and rules.

NOTE: QUESTIONS REGARDING VISITORS OF PARK RESIDENTS BRINGING THEIR DOGS WERE BROUGHT UP RECENTLY. THE PROSPECTUS WAS CHECKED TO TRY TO CLARIFY THE VISITING PET ISSUE. THE ONLY 'RULE' FOUND STATED THAT THE PET RULES OF THE PARK/RESIDENTS ARE THE SAME TO VISITING PETS. NONE OVER TWENTY POUNDS, WALK THEM IN THE QUALIFIED AREAS, AND CLEAN UP AFTER THEM. PLEASE MAKE SURE YOUR "GUESTS" FOLLOW OUR PET RULES.

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

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
